HALF-FED STOCK! GLUTS PORTLAND

MARKET IS DEPRESSED
BY HEAVY RECEIPTS

Good Prices Being Paid for Well Finished Stock, but Demand Cannot Be Filled from Present Receipts—Packers Refuse to Buy Because They Cannot Dispose of Product—Losing Game for Shippers.

Portland Union Stockyards, Oct. 1.—There was a very heavy run of hogs and sheep in the yards during the past 24 hours and this has caused still further depression in the general market. Poor stuff is coming forward so freely that the yards are glutted. Packers will not buy because they say they have no place to put the poor stuff and under this condition it is a losing game for shippers to supply the market just at present. This includes all lines.

Demand for well finished stuff is good in all lines and the high level of quotations is being maintained.

A year ago today cattle were weak but hogs and sheep were firm, all sales being made at unchanged values.

MORGAN'S SHAVE COSTS HIM SIX THOUSAND

Chicago, Oct. 2.—It cost J. Pierpont Morgan just \$6000 to get a shave today—and that by his own figuring, says a Lenox (Mass.) dispatch to the Tribune.

Mr. Morgan is here as the guest of Charles Lanier. Another guest of Mr. Lanier is Edwin V. Morgan, American minister to Cuba. The two started out early this morning for a ride and stopped in the village on their way back for a shave. There were just to barbers in the shop and they had to wait their turn.

"Rather expensive—this waiting," Edwin Morgan jocularly remarked. "Yes, it is; let me see," said the financier. He took an envelope and figured for a few minutes. "I've waited half an hour. This shave costs me just \$6000, with a quarter of a dollar tip thrown in," he announced.

CARRIES MESSAGE TO TRANS-MISSISSIPPI

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—As personal representative of President Roosevelt, William H. Wheeler, assistant secretary of the department of commerce and labor, who is a California man, will attend the trans-Mississippi congress which opens here October 6. It is understood that the president will express heartfelt sympathy with the purposes of the congress and will urge endorsement of the conservation of national resources.

TOM LAWSON NOW FACES NERVOUS BREAKDOWN

Boston, Oct. 1.—Thomas W. Lawson, author of "Frenzied Finance," who has recently been in the lime light in boosting "National Stock," is seriously ill at his home in this city with la grippe. Lawson's condition is largely due to nervous breakdown caused by his recent operations.

Fight Is Given Up.

Albuquerque, Oct. 1.—No further discussion of the forest reserve question marked today's session of the National Irrigation congress. It is generally believed that the fight on Chief Forester Pinchot will not be carried beyond the denunciation in the speeches already made. William Wheeler, assistant secretary of commerce and labor, is the personal representative of Roosevelt, and addressed the meeting today. The fight for the next convention appears to be between Spokane and Pueblo.

Washington Times Less.

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 1.—It was announced today that the state tax for the general fund levy will be about 2 mills this year as against 2½ mills last year. The school levy will be 2½ mills, the highway levy ¾, and the military levy 1½.
