NEARLY A MILLION IS SEWED IN TATTERED COAT

New York, Oct. 3.—Holding a draft for \$900,000 which appeared to be genuine, a man who spoke no English whatever entered the office of Surrogate Noble in Jamaica, L. I., yesterday. He intimated by signs that he wished to cash the draft.

The draft was drawn by the Bank of South Africa, in Capetown, upon the Bank of Montreal.

Adolph Moritz, the man who held the draft, was taken to the wholesale liquor store of Joseph Kaiser, who was

in the Boer war. Kaiser was able to communicate with him sufficiently to advise him to go home, as it was after banking hours, and to deposit the draft in a bank today. Moritz seemed grateful for Kaiser's advice and pinned the draft to the inside of his hunting shirt.

STATE OF IDAHO AFTER OFFICERS

ARREST OF FITZMAURICE IS CALLED KIDNAPPING

State Charges That Officials Drove Former Pendleton Man Into Washington State—Serious Offense May Lead to Long Time Sentence—Editor Insists Articles Were Written by Others in His Absence.

That Maurice Fitzmaurice was kidnapped instead of having walked into the state of Washington, is the latest claim of the litigious editor, and as a result the state of Idaho has demanded the arrest of Deputy Sheriff Mose Martin of Asotin county, Sheriff W. H. Dixon and Prosecuting Attorney A. A. Kirby of Garfield county, Wash., on a charge of kidnapping.

Warrants were issued and placed in the hands of Sheriff Harry Lyndon. Warrants charging John Doe and Richard Roe with conspiracy in the kidnapping case were also secured, but the officers decline to divulge the identity of the persons implicated. It is said that the editor was taken into a hack and rapidly driven into the state of Washington and the evidence now in the hands of the Nez Perce county officials suggests that the kidnapping of Fitzmaurice was in direct violation of the laws of the state of Idaho and County Attorney Daniel Needham has made a definite statement to the effect that this violation of the law will be most vigorously prosecuted. A ten year sentence might result from conviction.

It is understood that parties indirectly implicated in the kidnapping of the editor are ready to make complete statements covering all the features of the conspiracy and it is expected that sensational developments will be uncovered tomorrow.

Fitzmaurice, who is now in jail at Pomeroy, Wash., when asked if the report that he was abducted and carried across was true, said, "My lawyers forbid any statement." Later, however, he said that he could not contradict the statement that he was shanghaied into Washington.

Mr. Fitzmaurice says the alleged libelous articles were not written by him and that they were not published with his consent, but appeared while he was in Spokane and that he and Mr. Benbow are the best of friends. He declares that he knows the authors of the articles and that as soon as he is out he will write the complete history of the affair. He is sanguine as to his release.

Honor Mexican Hero.

City of Mexico, Oct. 3.—Patriotic Mexicans will tomorrow join in observing the centennial anniversary of the death of Jose Flores Verdad, the first martyr of Mexican independence. The ceremonies will include a procession and the unveiling of a marble slab in the wall of the old Episcopal palace of Casa de las Campanas, where Verdad was killed. The house occupies the same site as the palace of Montezuma I, from which the last Montezuma was hurled when he was killed.
