

## RATTLER PET TERRORIZES TOWN

FIVE-FOOT REPTILE  
ON PORTLAND'S STREETS

North Bank Cook Tames Snake and Brings it to City to Help Spend Wages—Frees Pet Until Arrested Then Carries it to Jail—Much Distressed When Officers Order Snake Killed.

Zoologists are agreed that the domestication of rattlesnakes has, with few exceptions, been proved to be impossible, yet this did not deter G. F. Quigley, until recently a cook in a North Bank construction camp, from adopting a 5-year-old rattler as a pet, says the Portland Telegram, and as a result of terrorizing the North End with the reptile last night, Quigley landed in jail, the snake is dead and the station force of the first night relief has not yet recovered from fright.

Several weeks ago Quigley, having heard the story of the domesticated snake which captured a burglar in its master's house and then rattled for a policeman, decided to go into the reptile-charming business himself. In preparing dinner for the members of the construction crew, the cook noticed a peculiar whirling sound coming from the flour barrel and upon investigation found a five-foot rattler in the receptacle.

Securing a forked stick and a glass jar Quigley managed to capture the snake and at once formulated plans for taming the deadly reptile. Within a week the snake had become so domesticated that it would eat out of Quigley's hand and follow him about the kitchen like a dog. At the expiration of 14 days Quigley no longer feared being bitten and allowed the rattler to bunk with him at night.

With his peculiar pet, Quigley came to Portland on a vacation Tuesday and not satisfied with one snake proceeded to load up on North End "chained lightning." Up to last night the bibulous cook had enough sense to keep the rattler in a glass jar, but becoming saturated with "joy juice" Quigley cast away the container and started up Burnside street holding the snake by the neck.

Within 10 minutes the street was deserted and Quigley had the thoroughfare to himself. Patrolmen Anderson and Murray were notified and in fear and trepidation crept up on the amateur snake charmer and placed him under arrest. Quigley, his jag and his snake were carted to police headquarters in the patrol wagon.

The spectacle of an intoxicated man holding a deadly rattlesnake in his hand, entering the station door was too much for Captain Moore and Desk Sergeant Sorenson and simultaneously they let out a yell.

"Kill that monster at once," commanded Moore from his hiding place behind his desk.

"Take that snake out of here," belated Sorenson, seeking refuge on a stool.

Quigley thought the matter a great joke and refused to kill his pet until again ordered to do so by Moore, who had by this time mustered up sufficient courage to advance to the counter.

With tears trickling down his cheeks, Quigley bade a fond farewell to his companion and, grabbing the faithful reptile by the tail, pulled off its head. A charge of drunkenness was placed against the cook and in the municipal court this morning Quigley, after paying a fine of \$2, disconsolately walked from the court room grieving for his dead pet.

### SALMON NEVER EAT ON TRIPS UP COLUMBIA RIVER.

The salmon in the Columbia do not eat a morsel after leaving the ocean to ascend the river, until they reach the spawning grounds at Swan Falls, Idaho. Government biologists are endeavoring to fathom how the fish can have the energy to travel about 600 miles without nourishment.

Treadwell Nichols, with Messrs. C. Alfred and R. M. Lehamon, under supervision of Dr. C. W. Greene of Missouri, was sent by the Bureau of Fisheries at Washington to Seufert's fisheries, recently to study the Columbia river salmon.

These fish do not eat a morsel after leaving the ocean to ascend the Columbia for the spawning grounds, and when they reach these places there are no digestive organs in use, being shriveled and useless. The examination of the internal parts of the salmon was taken by Dr. Greene and the students of Science while at Seufert's fisheries at The Dalles, and ground fine, being preserved in alcohol and bottled. These bottles were sent to the Bureau of Fisheries at Washington where the contents of the same will be analyzed to ascertain what gives so much energy to the salmon that they are able to ascend such rapids as exist at the Cascades of the Columbia and the long distance intervening between the ocean and the spawning grounds at Swan Falls, Idaho, and that vicinity, this distance being about 600 miles. The salmon display a great deal of energy in making the long run, never eating anything en route. It is believed that adult salmon never return to the ocean.
