PHILADELPHIA CELEBRATES NATAL ANNIVERSARY.

Philadelphia, Oct. 3.—At 6 o'clock tomorrow evening the Quaker City will be aroused from its slumbers by the ringing of Independence Hall bell and all the church chimes and bells of the city, and the celebration of the 225th anniversary of the founding of Philadelphia will be on in earnest. Many months of busy preparation and the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars have paved the way for next week's climax, which will be the most magnificent historical pageant in the world's history.

Tomorrow will be "religious day" and the program includes special services in all the churches of the city, in which many patriotic fraternal organizations will participate, with great open-air meetings in various squares and parks. Thousands of Philadelphia Sunday school children will sing "My Country, 'Tis of Thee."

Civic and Military day will be observed Monday, with a parade of 25,000 troops. Municipal day will be observed Tuesday. Wednesday will be industrial day, with what promises to be the largest industrial parade ever witnessed in the United States. The mighty climax of the week will be the historical pageant on Friday, with 40 magnificent floats and 5000 characters shown. The pageant will depict the entire history of Philadelphia, from the time William Penn made his first voyage to this country in December, 1682, in the good ship Welcome.
