BIG DAMAGE CAUSED BY DISASTROUS WIND AND FIRE

Williams, Ariz., Oct. 3.—Damage amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars was reported today as the result of a gale which swept across Arizona, among other damage starting a disastrous fire which destroyed property valued at \$200,000. Crops have been ruined, buildings blown down, telephone and telegraph wires are badly crippled and giant trees were destroyed. The fire started in the Babbitt general merchandise store and destroyed six buildings in the heart of the business section of this city. The fire had been burning an hour when an explosion of dynamite shattered the ruins of the Babbitt store.

Family Reunion Here.

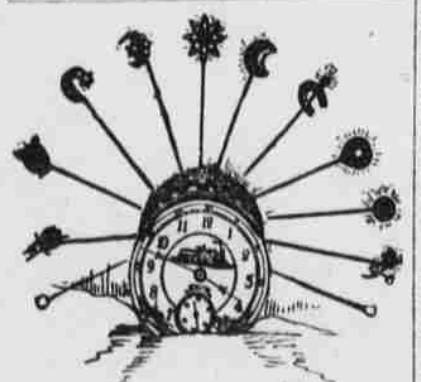
