STUDY OF WHEAT FOR UMATILLA

Professor Jardine Has Been Investigating Conditions With View to Establishing What Varieties Are Best Suited to the Soil and Conditions of Umatilla County—Recommends Bluestem and Turkey Red.

That Bluestem and Turkey Red are the two varieties of wheat most suited to the greatest profitable growth in this section, and that it is possible for them to be improved to be even more suitable is the opinion of Professor M. N. Jardine, in charge of the dry farming investigations at the state agricultural college, who has written Judge Stephen A. Lowell of this city, who has been cooperating with Prof. Jardine in securing information upon which experiments which are expected to be of value to local wheat growers will be used.

Professor Jardine intimates that the state experiment station may be able to take up the study of such problems and hopes that the result will be of much benefit. His letter to Judge Lowell is given herewith:

Washington, D. C., Sept. 23, 1908.
Hon. Stephen A. Lowell,
Pendleton, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—
I have your letter of September 15, stating the results of an interview with one of your most progressive farmers. I am very glad to get the information furnished regarding varieties of wheat grown in your locality.

The Bluestem wheat I find the standard variety through the Columbia Basin—at least so far as milling quality is concerned its yield, how-

ever, is possibly less than that of the other varieties, which I believe is chiefly due to the fact that it is generally grown as a spring wheat. Of the wheats enumerated by you, the only one that could compete with the Bluestem is the Turkey. It is quite likely that the Turkey wheat will become softer and hence less valuable as a milling wheat through continued growth in your section. I found, however, while in Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho, that the millers were this year paying a premium of two and three cents a bushel for the Turkey Red wheat over all the other varieties except Bluestem, and in some places they were paying as much for it as for the Bluestem, although in others the Bluestem was bringing one to three cents more per bushel than the Turkey.

These two varieties are the best of which I know for your section. Whether or not they can be improved so as to be more suitable for that territory can only be determined by investigation. I am confident, however, that through careful selection the milling and yielding qualities of both of these varieties could be greatly improved. I am looking forward to the time when we can cooperate with the state of Oregon in carrying on such experimental work. I know of no other territory in the United States where there is a chance for greater and better work in the development of cereals.

This office would be glad to supply any reliable farmers with small amounts of grain for trial, although it is doubtful if this would be a satisfactory way to test the value of one variety over another kind. The kind of work necessary in your district, it would seem to me, would be special plant selection work conducted on a farm in the locality where these varieties are expected to be grown. Seed introduced from one section to another requires considerable time to become adapted to its new environment, hence the work would be very slow and unsatisfactory if carried on by farmers operating on a large scale. I hope that in the near future we shall be able to cooperate with the Oregon station in carrying on this work.

E. H. SHEPARD CONDUCTS SUCCESSFUL SPRAYING

E. H. Shepard, who has been making some experiments in the spray line, states that last fall he sprayed his trees with blue vitrol, says the Glacier. In the spring just before the buds commenced to swell he sprayed them with Bordeaux mixture and for other sprays used Bordeaux mixed with arsenate of lead except for the calyx spray. As a result he says that an examination which he has just made in his orchard discloses the fact that less than one-half per cent of the fruit is wormy or stung, but one per cent shows any trace of fungus. The damp weather this year is said to have developed considerable fungus in the valley and Mr. Shepard thinks it can be reduced to a minimum by an application of sprays such as those

he used during the fall, winter and summer.

MRS. LONGWORTH --GENERAL APATHY

DAUGHTER OF PRESIDENT
VICTIM OF CAMPAIGNER

More Interested in Styles Than in Political Matters—Will Not Accompany Nicholas on Spellbinding Tours—Is Not Planning to Attend the Inauguration Next March—Thinks Mrs. Taft Would Be Charming in White House.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Less interesting to Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth are the changes in administration, apparently, than are the revolutionary upheavals in the fall styles. At least this is the impression she gave as she sat in her suite at the Annex, encircled by the current magazines and reinforced by the box of chocolates, as inevitable as a stage property in a melodrama, where the wives of the national politicians appear.

And this, too, notwithstanding she was an important member of a campaign party here assembled.

"They are dreadfully unbecoming," she remarked in the presence of Mr. Longworth, James Schoolcraft Sherman and one or two other politicians who had come together in her suite intent on the subjects of the day. She was not referring to them, however, nor their raiment, but to that other national issue, the sheath skirt.

"Unless they are made by someone who knows mighty well what she is doing they make you look a fright, you know." She spoke with something of the spirit of her father. And to reinforce her own lack of sympathy with the new style she had one of the most attractive of the season's tailor-made dresses, much more ample in cut than those of the current styles and with a skirt elaborately plaited.

"No, I am not going with my husband on his campaign tour," she laughed. "No politics and no campaigning for me this year. You may say that Mrs. Longworth will go to Washington to remain with her parents while her husband is on the campaigning tour."

"I wanted to make the whole trip, but the season has been a wearing one and I am not so fond of one night stands as I used to be—signs of age, you know. The trip through Yellowstone this summer tired me. To be sure, it's a tiring trip—150 miles by stage—but I never felt it before."

"Politics gets a little tiring when you have been in it for years. No, I should think I wasn't going to make a speech. And I haven't begun to think about the inauguration yet. I doubt if I am there I have met Mrs. Taft and I think her charming. I can imagine no more attractive mistress of the White House than she."

But of other matters political, Mrs. Longworth did not speak.
