POLICE ON TRACK OF MISSING MAN

BONER BOARDED TRAIN AT BARNHART STATION.

Bound for Western Points According to One—Boy Believed to Be Partially Demented as Well as Paralyzed—Boy Disappeared While Father Was Using Telephone—Officers Believe He Will Be Located Today.

Will Boner, the missing young man for whom his father and the police have been searching since yesterday about noon, boarded a westbound freight train at Barnhart station about 5 o'clock last evening. This was the information gained by Chief of Police Gurdane this morning and is the first intimation as to the direction taken by the young man, who is supposed to be partially demented as well as partially paralyzed.

Young Boner, who is about 26 years of age, was brought to this city for treatment several days ago by his father, G. W. Boner, a prominent sheepman of Walla Walla county. It seems the young man had suffered a stroke of paralysis while at Sand Point, Idaho, several weeks ago, and was brought here by his father as

soon as the parent heard of his son's illness.

He has been improving rapidly and is now able to walk about, though one arm is helpless and he has but little use of one leg. He disappeared yesterday morning while his father was phoning to a daughter at Walla Walla and owing to his almost helpless condition and his lack of means it was feared he had wandered off and been seized with another attack of the disease. It seems, however, that he objected to returning to Walla Walla and that he has deliberately undertaken to beat his way in the opposite direction.

So far as can be ascertained by the officers and his almost frantic father, young Boner walked as far as Barnhart, where he boarded the freight train last evening. The telephone has been called into use and it is believed he will be located this afternoon or tomorrow.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS GUARD AGAINST TYPHOID

Because of the prevalence of typhoid in the city the school board, through City Superintendent Landers, has issued orders that all the drinking water at the various public schools be boiled. This is now already being done at the high school and it was announced this afternoon that the other schools will be required to do likewise.

At the present time two popular high school students are ill and this fact has brought the matter of taking precautionary measures home to the school people. Clem McCoy, step-son of John Greulich, is one of those now ill with the fever. He has been at the hospital for several weeks.

Miss Effie Parkes, daughter of Judge and Mrs. Joe Parkes, is the other student who is ill. She is at her home and it is feared she has typhoid.

CAPTAIN BUCHANAN DEAD.

"Father of Oregon Pythianism" Died in Portland Sunday.

In local Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellow circles there is deep regret over the death in Portland night before last of Captain D. E. Buchanan, pioneer steamboat man and capitalist. He died after a lingering illness and was 70 years of age.

Captain Buchanan was the first grand chancellor of Oregon in the Knights of Pythias and his continued zeal in behalf of the order caused him to be called the father of Oregon Pythianism. At the last session of the grand lodge he delivered an inspiring address and was given an ovation.

The funeral will be held in Portland tomorrow afternoon and will be conducted by the grand lodge K. of P.

Grand Chancellor Gus C. Moser has called all grand officers to Portland to attend the service.

J. W. Mahoney of this city, who is a past grand chancellor of the order, left for Portland this afternoon.

Captain Buchanan was also a member of the Odd Fellows.

TEACHERS GET SHARE OF FUNDS

SUPERINTENDENT WELLS MAKES APPORTIONMENT

Sum of Over \$7000 Is to Be Divided Among Schools of County—Task of Allotting Portions to Each District Is No Easy One—Amount Is Larger Than Last Year—Due to Smaller Spring Apportionment.

The regular October apportionment of state and county school funds is now being worked out by County School Superintendent Welles, who expects to complete his task by tomorrow or next day. The total amount of county funds to be apportioned is \$7,755.11 cents, while the state fund amounts to \$10,174.35.

According to the present law the county fund must be diminished by several dollars before the per capita apportionment can be made. Every district whose teacher or teachers has attended a county or state institute the required number of hours is given \$5 for each teacher and every district which has employed a teacher and conducted a school the required number of months, which is four, is given \$50. After these sums are taken out the per capita apportionment of the county is 50 cents.

From the state fund the per capita apportionment is \$1.60. It will be seen from this that it will be difficult task to determine just how much money each district is entitled to.

Last October the per capita apportionment of county funds, after the other sums had been deducted was 70 cents and the state apportionment was \$1.75. The shortage in the county funds is accounted for by the fact that the April apportionment this year was much larger than last year, leaving less to be divided in October.

Virgil Wade Found Guilty.

After being out but a few minutes, the jury in the case of Virgil Wade, charged with simple assault, last evening brought in a verdict of guilty. Wade is the young man who was accused of having assaulted Herman Lehman, an old man and a cripple, near Pilot Rock, about two years ago. The altercation resulted from a dispute over a bill which Wade is alleged to have owed Lehman. Tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock was the time fixed for passing sentence.

Henry Howland Has Paralysis.

Henry Howland, father of Ralph Howland of the First National bank, is now ill at his son's home on the north side of the river. He was stricken with paralysis some time ago and while his condition shows improvement he is still in a somewhat precarious condition.

Saratoga Chips (Anti-dyspeptic).

Most dishes requiring deep frying are denied the dyspeptic because they are usually fried in lard, and lard does not "agree." The following recipe will be welcomed by those of poor digestion: Peel the potatoes and slice thin into cold water. Drain well, and dry in a towel. Fry a few at a time in hot Cottonseed oil. Salt as you take them out, and lay them on coarse brown paper for a short time.

The above recipe can be followed without the least fear of disagreeable after effects. The chips will be crisp and dry—not greasy, as when fried in lard. Cottonseed contains no hog fat, but is made of purest vegetable oil; it is recommended by physicians generally.
