Fatal Fight in Wagon.
Chehalis, Wash.—A man named Goodell, while in company with four others in a wagon Friday night, traveling from this city to Forest, was shot in the head near the nose, the bullet ranging upward. The five men are said to have been under the influence of liquor and Goodell pulled a revolver from his pocket and began to threaten the others. He fired two shots over his head at those sitting in the back of the wagon. Billy Reno, one of the men in the rear seat, grabbed the hand in which Goodell was holding his revolver and in the struggle to get it away from him, Reno says Goodell pulled the trigger and sent a bullet into his own head.

First Irrigation Step.
Vale, Ore.—The first big land deal following the commencement of the Willow Creek irrigation project has just been consummated by J. W. Richards and other capitalists interested in the undertaking. 329 acres of land which will be under the ditch being sold by them to a rancher of Denver, Colo., for \$32,000, the highest price ever paid for land in the Willow creek valley. The promoters who made the purchase spent but one day in the city. They say that water will be turned on by the commencement of the next irrigation season. The project will irrigate 100,000 acres of land directly tributary to this city.

Revolting Allegations.
Wallace, Idaho.—Charged with trafficking in women for immoral purposes, Emil Vanceamp, owner of thousands of dollars' worth of property in Wallace, has been bound over to the federal court at Moscow in the sum of \$3000, and Jennie Girard, his alleged wife, in the sum of \$1000. Boy Hunter Is Killed.
The Dalles.—William Harvey of Mosier, 18 years old, accidentally shot himself while hunting near his home Friday, his body being found Saturday morning by an uncle, Joseph Harvey. Young Harvey went hunting and when he did not return home for supper relatives became alarmed and instituted a search. The hunt was continued all night. At an early hour Saturday the uncle found the dead body in the woods two miles from Mosier. The bullet, which from all indications caused instant death pierced the lad's forehead.

Jacks Ruin Valley Crops.
Monroe, Ore.—In a recent dispatch from Salem, mention is made of the fact that the black-tailed jack rabbit has just made its initial appearance in the Willamette valley. Benton and Lane counties are overrun with these pests, and have been for four or five years. In many instances outside gardens are practically destroyed by them, and on account of the lay of the land, it is going to be a difficult task to get rid of them.

Electric Route Approved.
North Yakima, Wash.—The location map for the electric line that proposes to follow the Columbia river from Wenatchee to the mouth of the Snake and then across the country to Walla Walla has just been approved by the general land office for a part of the distance, and it is believed that construction will begin before very long. The portion that has been approved lies within the district of the North Yakima land office.

New Hotel at The Dalles.
The Dalles.—The plans for the new hotel to be built by The Dalles Hotel company have been accepted as drawn up by a local architect. The building will be 90 feet deep by 100 feet wide, having a 40-foot court in the center of the front. The hotel will be much like the Portland hotel in architecture. It will be built of brick with a concrete foundation and will be modern in every particular.

Y. W. C. A. Convention.
Salem.—The state convention of the Women's Christian association in this city proved to be a most successful one. About 50 delegates were present and the sessions were decidedly

interesting. The convention closed Sunday with meetings at Kimball college and the Methodist church.

Baker School in Ruins.
Baker City, Ore.—As a climax to the many small fires which have caused uneasiness in this city recently, the handsome North Baker school building was destroyed by the incendiary's torch Friday night, causing a loss of \$20,000, with but \$8500 insurance.

Killed by Cavett.
Wallace, Idaho.—Olaf M. Peterson, employed in the Standard mine at Mace, working on night shift, was caught by a cavin Friday night and crushed so badly that he died shortly after being removed from the mine.

O. R. & N. WILL MAKE MUCH BETTER TIME.

The O. R. & N. has begun the laying of 75-pound steel rails of a similar character to those being laid on the new Troutdale-Bonneville cutoff for the distance from the end of the cut-off to The Dalles, says the Journal. This will give the line 75-pound rails the entire distance between Portland and The Dalles, and will allow trains to make very fast time along the river division. The improvements on the tracks in Oregon are believed to be preliminary to the establishment of a fast limited train between Portland and Chicago via the Harriman lines.

The Troutdale-Bonneville cut-off is nearing completion, 16 miles of the 17 that comprises the cut-off having been graded and 12.5 miles of track having been laid. The railroad is spending nearly \$1,000,000 on this part of the line, it being figured that the work will cost about \$45,000 a mile. Although the distance in miles between Portland and Huntington is only shortened 12 miles, yet 1454 degrees of curvature are being eliminated and the sharpest curve has been reduced from 10 degrees to 3 degrees.

In addition to this 50 vertical feet of gradient have been removed.

The 7 1/2 miles of track between the end of the cut-off at Bonneville and The Dalles, the end of the division, are being laid with 75-pound rails, and five miles of this work will be completed by November 1. The laying of the new rails here is entirely outside of the appropriation for the cut-off.
