NORTHWEST NOTES

Round Up Local Option Violators. Grants Paid—Over \$500 in fines was yesterday paid by violators of the local option law in Josephine county, indicted this week by the grand jury, and who pleaded guilty before the circuit court. Ten other indictments were returned by the grand jury, against parties who have been engaged in the sale of liquor contrary to law.

This is the biggest "round up" of local option law violators that has occurred since the law went into effect.

Would Hit Jap Chauffeurs.

Seattle, Wash.—The first anti-Japanese legislation attempted in this state will be proposed Monday at the session of the city council's license and revenue committee, when Councilman Mullen will offer an amendment to the pending automobile ordinance, prohibiting any but citizens of the United States or those who have declared their intention to become such from holding licenses as automobile chauffeurs. There are a large number of Japanese now employed as chauffeurs in Seattle.

Oregon City Regulates Saloons.

Oregon City, Ore.—The council last night passed an ordinance which will compel saloons to raise their curtains and blinds over the windows after closing hours at night and on Sunday. Only after a hot discussion was the ordinance enacted. Councilman Pope alone voting against it, while Mr. Knapp was excused from voting. Mr. Pope said there is already plenty of ordinances to regulate saloons, but a majority of the members did not agree with him.

Want to Vote Baker Dry.

Baker City.—Efforts to vote Baker city dry will be made at the election next fall, according to plans of the anti-saloon forces. The first meeting of the anti-saloon forces was called at the request of J. R. Knodell of Portland, state superintendent of the anti-saloon league. Rev. E. F. Zimmerman of Pendleton, superintendent for eastern Oregon, was present and spoke briefly to the meeting which was well attended and enthusiastic. On Sunday the Rev. Knodell and Rev. Zimmerman will preach in the Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist churches, and will also conduct an open-air meeting in the interest of their work.

Wild Boar Attacks Rangers.

Lakeview.—M. E. Musgrave and S. A. Brown, forest rangers, were attacked by a wild boar while camped near Dog lake, about twenty miles from this city. They killed the animal after a hard fight. It was tall and shaggy, but exceptionally poor.

He had pounded the stray cow up on the street, and seeing that she had not yet been milked, he had driven her to the fire station to relieve her overful udder. For her contempt of court Judge Wendt fined the cow one milking, and ordered it fed to the litter of coach pups that are the pride of the firemen.

Trap Shooters to Elgin.

Elgin.—The Eastern Oregon Blue Rock association will hold its second shoot in Elgin early in May and already has made arrangements for attractive prizes. Aside from the beautiful silver loving cup which is now held by George Maples of Elgin there will be awarded a gold medal and minor prizes in the way of sporting goods, guns and tackle offered by the merchants. RENEWING TELEPHONE POLES WITH CONCRETE

It is estimated that three and a half million wooden poles used by electric companies in this country require renewal each year. These poles are perfectly sound except at the bottom line; and as it costs more to renew a pole than to set a new pole, a scheme of reinforcing the poles with concrete has recently been devised. It consists in bridging the weakened part with reinforcing rods driven into the pole above and below the decayed portion. Concrete is the moulded around the pole over the reinforcing rods. In this way the pole can be rendered even stronger than it was originally and at very little expense.—Scientific American.

"MOTHER'S DAY" IS CREATED ILLINOIS HOLIDAY

Chicago.—The white carnation, emblem of "Mother's day" will be widely worn in Chicago, May 9. It will be the city's first observance of the holiday created unofficially in honor of mother. Observance will be held in churches and hospitals. General Henry M. Nevius, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, and Edgar Allen, commander-in-chief of the Sons of Veterans, have issued requests to all posts throughout the United States asking that each member of the two organizations wear a white carnation. "Mother's day" is set aside as an official state holiday by Governor H. S. Vesey, of South Dakota.

STRONG LOBBY WORKS FOR FREE HIDES

Washington.—The strongest and best financially equipped lobby in Washington at the present time is the one working to have hides, which now pay a duty of 15 per centum ad valorem, placed on the free list. The tanners and leather manufacturers of the country have a large force of attorneys and paid lobbyists at the capital working in all hours and seasons to have the duty on importations of hides taken off. Members of the finance committee who have had experience in framing previous tariff bills say that no such efforts have ever been put forth as those which the advocates of free hides are now making. On the other hand, the farmers and cattle men, who would be directly injured by placing hides on the free list, have no effectual organization at the capital looking after their interests. Senator Warren of Wyoming and Senators from cattle-raising states are somewhat discouraged at the outlook, particularly so as their hands do not seem to be strengthened by live stock associations representing the producers.

Party questions do not enter into the controversy, as a number of Democratic Senators, particularly those

from Texas and Oklahoma, are strongly in favor of a protective duty on this product. On the other hand, the New England and Middle states, also Wisconsin, Michigan and Illinois, where there are tanneries, are favoring the free hide proposition. Western ranchmen and farmers should get busy with telegrams, letters and petitions to congress if they wish hides to remain protected.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS BUY ALBERTA LAND

Calgary, Alberta, April 26.—The Catholic order of the Knights of Columbus has just purchased 25,000 acres of irrigated land a few miles northeast of Strathmore, from the Canadian Pacific railroad company for a colonization project. The purchase price was \$25 per acre or a total of \$625,000 for the entire tract, on 10 years' time, and it will be sold off in quarter and half sections to actual settlers.

The purchase was made after a year's search for a permanent investment for the accumulated funds of the order and the trustees consider that they have acquired property which will be worth more than \$1,000,000 long before the last payment is due.
