Ontairo, Or .- Secretary Ballinger of the interior department, has telegraphed the reclamation officials at Boise ordering immediate work in field to begin by surveyors and engineers for the Malheur government irrigation project. F. E. Weymouth, supervising engineers for this reclamation district, is at Boise today, gathering a crew of engineers and surveyors and says he will be in Ontario within a day or two to begin work.

Secretary Ballinger directs that the work be hastened sufficiently to permit his personal inspection when he visits Ontario in June. He states that if the project looks feasible at that time he will order the work to be comleted as soon as possible.

People here feel sure the governpent project will be built, as former surveyors promised great success, Private interests, who have been protesting against the government project, were heard by secretary Ballinger in Washington last week, and he stated to them that if they could show definitely they were financially able to build the project and that the people want a private project, they may be permitted to build.
