## FIRST BIG BALL GAME OF SEASON

PLAYED SUNDAY BETWEEN PENDLETON AND WALLA WALLA

Walla Walla Boosters Will Come Over on a Special Excursion Train—Expected to be Accompanied by Several Hundred Garden City Fans—First Meeting of the Rival Teams Since Last Summer—Great Interest Manifested.

Local fans will have the opportunity Sunday of witnessing the first really big ball game of the season. The contending teams will be the Pendleton Indians and the Walla Walla Boosters.

The Walla Walla players will come to Pendleton Sunday morning on a special excursion train which will also carry a few hundred enthusiastic rooters. The Walla Walla management has been booming the excursion for several days and it is expected that one of the biggest crowds in many seasons will be on hand to see the game.

In addition to being the first big game of the season it will be the first time that teams from the rival cities have crossed bats since the dissolution of the Inland Empire league teams last summer. Both aggregations are this year composed of amateurs, and being known to all the inhabitants of each of the towns, more interest is being manifested in the games than if the teams were composed of better players, though professionals.

The lineup of the Walla Walla team is not known but the local players will probably line up as follows: Hutchinsonson or Dickson, p; Collins, c; Robbins, ss; Nordine, 1b; Bartlett, 2b; Baker, 3b; Hartman, rf; Strand, cf; and Nelson lf.

### WOMAN SLAYER HANGED.

Killed Woman he Could Not Reform and Dies Brave.

Boise, Idaho, May 7.—Displaying remarkable nerve, Fred Seward, the murderer of Clara O'Neill, of the underworld at Moscow, in October, walked to the gallows in the Idaho penitentiary this morning and was hanged.

"Do a good job, Rich," he said to the deputy warden as the cap was placed over his head. He bid goodbye as he passed the other prisoners on his death march.

After falling to induce the O'Neill woman to lead a better life, Seward held her in one hand and fired a bullet through her heart with the other. His attempt to commit suicide was unsuccessful.

### BLOODY FIGHTING AT ACAYUCAN, MEXICO

Vera Cruz, Mex., May 7.—The American vice consul left here for Acajucan today in an effort to liberate Harold Sanborn, of Chicago, who is dangerously wounded and under arrest there. It was learned today that Macario Vinces, the planter who tried to quell the fight among the drunken Mexicans, killed all the victims except a girl, whom Sanborn killed. Rioting, shooting and knifeing are reported at the Santa Fe ranch near Tlacotalpam. The disorders are believed to have resulted in the shooting Wednesday when seven were killed.
