TWO CARLOADS OF CALVES SHIPPED TO PORTLAND

Improvement Work on Newport Park—Chicago Father Will Hold Mass in Hermiston—Thanksgiving Party Planned.

(Special Correspondence.) Hermiston, Nov. 20.—Two carloads of fine veal calves were loaded at the O. R. & N. stockyards this week and shipped to Portland by H. A. Waterman. This is a portion of the several hundred head of cattle being wintered at the Waterman stock ranch at the mouth of Butter creek.

On Sunday, November 21, Rev. Father Hyacinth, a member of the missionary order of Servites, of Chicago, will celebrate mass at the Hermiston hall at 10 a. m. A meeting of all the Catholic men of the town will be held immediately after the mass.

What promises to be one of the prettiest parties Hermiston has seen is the ball to be given by the firemen of the city in the Hermiston Mercantile Co. hall on Wednesday night, November 24—Thanksgiving eve.
