CANNOT REMOVE TIMBER FROM HOMESTEAD

Spokane, Wash.—Lumber mill and mine operators in Spokane look upon the decision of the federal court for northern Idaho in its new ruling on mine timber as the most far-reaching that has been handed down in years. The court found the Bunker Hill & Sullivan Mining company guilty of willful trespass and gave judgment to the government for \$3,397. W. M. Messenger, a homestead entryman of Kellogg, Idaho, sold that amount of timber from his claim and then relinquished. The court ruled that the homesteader cannot hide behind the statute of 1878 and remove timber off the land, even after a mining claim has been located on land subsequent to homestead filing. It was held that while the law in question permitted the removal of timber from mining land for mining purposes it cannot be construed to cover the removal of timber from land taken as a homestead. There are scores of similar cases in Idaho and other states in the northwest.

Form Aero Club.

Notre Dame, Ind.—Plans begun some months ago at the University of Notre Dame for the study and practice of aerial navigation by the students are considered sufficiently matured to be put into practical operation, and a permanent organization has been formed, known as the Aero Club of Notre Dame.

So far work has been confined to the building of several engines and a detailed study of the types of flying machines used by the most successful aviators. The biplane has been given the most attention and the machines now in process of construction are of this type.

REVIVALIST KOONTZ SON OF PIONEER PENDLETON PASTOR

"I believe in a topless heaven and a bottomless hell."

"I love every church that exalts our Christ."

There are other people whom other churches can get to heaven that we cannot but I was born in a Methodist parsonage and I expect to die in one if I die at home.

These are some of the striking expressions in the introduction to the first revival sermon preached at the Methodist church by Rev. E. E. Koontz last night. He will preach again tonight, the service commencing at 7:30, and will continue the revival meetings for a week or longer.

This is not the first visit of Rev. Koontz to Pendleton and Umatilla county. When he was but a small child his father, the late Rev. R. W. Koontz was the pastor of the Methodist church in this city and later in Athena. Two sons, Ed and Fred Koontz still live in Athena, the former being in the bank at that place. The revivalist is a nephew of J. H. Koontz of Echo.
