Union Stockyards, Nov. 23 .- Trade n the livestock market has begun to show a holiday character. Business at Stockdale during the past 24 hours was rather quiet.

All lines are inclined to show coniderable steadiness and no weakness apparent anywhere.

Run of hogs during the 24 hours was 332 head compared with none yesterday, 522 Saturday, 664 Friday, 25 Thursday, 1227 Wednesday and 112 head a week ago today.

A year agotoday the total run of hogs in the Portland stockyards was 90 head. Even then the market was nerely steady with no change in

Steers Remain Firm at \$4.65, Two lots of steers were sold in the pen market during the past 24 hours at \$4.65. One of these averaged 1190 ounds, while the other averaged I,-49 pounds. Both lots consisted of
