STEADINESS IN ALL LINES OF STOCK

STEERS STILL REMAIN FIRM AT \$4.65

Wonderful Strength Shown in Steer Market—Only Few Cows Arrive—Sheep Market Is Improving.

Union Stockyards, Nov. 23.—Trade in the livestock market has begun to show a holiday character. Business at Stockdale during the past 24 hours was rather quiet.

All lines are inclined to show considerable steadiness and no weakness is apparent anywhere.

Run of hogs during the 24 hours was 332 head compared with none yesterday, 522 Saturday, 564 Friday, 325 Thursday, 1227 Wednesday and 212 head a week ago today.

A year ago today the total run of hogs in the Portland stockyards was 99 head. Even then the market was merely steady with no change in prices.

Steers Remain Firm at \$4.65. Two lots of steers were sold in the open market during the past 24 hours at \$4.65. One of these averaged 1190 pounds, while the other averaged 1,240 pounds. Both lots consisted of 26 head.

While there was no rush to buy steers during the day, the market is inclined to continue its former wonderful strength, and whenever the quality is presented, and buyers are willing to pay the quoted figures.

Only a few cows are now coming forward, while a week ago the run in the cattle market consisted principally of the variety. Although there is no scarcity of cows at this time, the market retains all of its old strength and no change is noted in prices.

Some of the calves that arrived yesterday were sold today. Demand for these remains very good, and sales have been made recently up to \$5.25 for good stuff. Buyers say it is exceedingly difficult to get top quality. This would likely bring a still higher figure.

A year ago today the total run of a fair run of cattle, but prices were firm with no change from the previous day.

Sheep Position Growing Better.

Position of the local sheep and lamb market is daily improving, while the past few days have shown a fair increase in the arrivals, buyers are taking hold somewhat better than they were, all sales being easily made at prices as printed.

Run of sheep and lambs today was 219 head, compared with 582 yesterday, 576 Saturday, none Friday, 243 Thursday and 223 last Wednesday. A week ago there were no arrivals of sheep in the yards. The same was true a year ago. At the latter period the sheep market was firm at unchanged range of prices.

The following is the general range of livestock values in the yards: Cattle—Best steers, weighing 1200 pounds, \$4.50@4.65; medium steers, 4.25@4.40; best cows, \$3.60@3.75; best heifers, \$3.75; bulls, \$1.75@2; stags, \$2.50@3.

Hogs—Best east of themountains, \$3.05@3.15; Willamette valley best, \$3.75@3.85; stockers, \$3.50@3.65; pigs, \$2.50@2.75.

Sheep—Best wethers, \$4.50; ordinary, \$4.00@4.25; spring lambs, \$5.25; straight ewes, \$3.50@4; mixed lots, \$4.

Cattle—Best, \$5.00@5.25; ordinary, \$3.50@4.50.

Gridley, who commanded Admiral Dewey's flagship at the battle of Manila Bay and to whom the admiral gave the famous order: "When you are ready, Gridley, fire."

The tablet is of golden bronze, 3 1/2 by 2 1/2 feet. A panel on the left contains a medallion portrait of Captain Gridley, and on the right, separated from this by a conventional arrangement of oak leaves, is the inscription.

THE WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO WHEAT LOWERS AT CLOSE

Reports From Argentina and Armour's Action Cause Activity in the Market.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—Local wheat opened unchanged to 1-4c higher but closed 1-8 to 1-2c a bushel under yesterday.

Market received a flying start because of the many conflicting reports concerning the situation in Argentina. This influenced wheat quotations abroad, which in turn influenced the opening of pit prices here.

Action of the market in the early trading was likewise influenced by the excellent cash situation and general range was about 1-4c higher than yesterday's final at today's top.

Selling movement started with the report that Armour was a heavy seller of the December, this influencing the other two options with the result that the market steadily declined after touching the high mark.

HARRISBURGERS SEE BALL OF FIRE IN HEAVENS

About 4 o'clock Sunday morning occurred one of the most unusual phenomena ever witnessed here. A huge ball of fire appeared in the heavens in a northerly direction from Harrisburg and remained to all appearances stationary for several minutes, lighting up the country around with great brilliancy, objects near and far being easily discernible. The ball

swung high in the air and neither increased nor diminished in size and brilliancy, suddenly bursting and falling eastward in long tails of fire.

This phenomenon was witnessed by several people who were on their way home from a late lodge session. The brilliant light also awakened several people. None of the witnesses in this section noticed any report at the time of the ball's collapse, and from this it is inferred that the ball of fire must have been miles away.

The theory that it was a meteor hardly held good from the fact that it remained permanent—or apparently so—until it burst, and when it appeared the surroundings were suddenly illuminated much the same as though a huge electric bulb had suddenly been turned on. New York.—William Watson, an English poet, whose recent lines which are supposed to reflect on a well-known English woman, caused a sensation abroad and here, is coming to America. He cables: "I am told that a storm has been aroused against me in America. Therefore, I am coming to face it, sailing on the Lusitania on November 25."

On the appearance of Watson's much discussed poem, Richard La-Gallienne issued a few stanzas, strongly criticizing Watson. In an interview Watson replied that he would come to America to meet La-Gallienne face to face, implying that he named and suggested boxing gloves with Jeffries and Sharkey as referees, and that the bout be held for a select gathering of men and women, "including Mrs. Watson."
