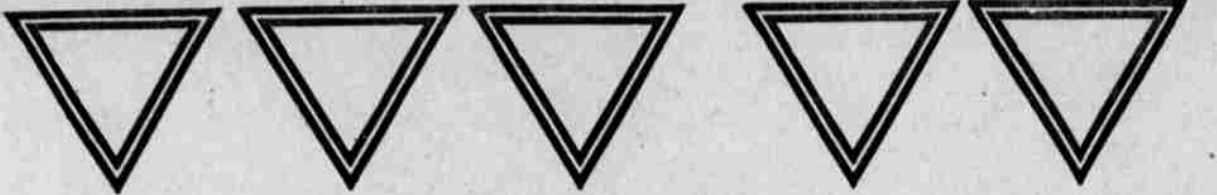
Indians Observe Day.
At the Presbyterian mission on Tutuilla yesterday 115 members of the Indian church attending a Thanksgiving dinner and a service conducted by Rev. J. M. Cornelison. It was a very successful affair and in view of the fact that many Indians were attending a "feast for the dead" at Black Hawk's place the attendance was large. In the evening a Thanksgiving service was held at the agency school and Rev. Cornelison attended. The president's proclamation was read by Major Schwartzlander.

Library Books Ready.
At the county school superintendent's office some 1500 volumes of new books are now ready for distribution among the school districts of the county. The books were selected some months ago, but arrived at the superintendent's office only recently. They will now be sent to the respective district as fast as instructions to do so are received by Superintendent Welles. Each district must pay the freight upon the books secured. Of all the books chosen this year, the Child's Life Second Reader appears as the most popular. Seventeen copies of that book were ordered, whereas but two or three copies were secured of most of the remaining volumes.

MEN DRIFT TO SEA IN ESCAPED BARGES.
New York, Nov. 26.—Ten men aboard the barges Conewago and Stetson are drifting seaward before a stiff gale and are facing death today. Both barges are loaded with coal, and were blown away from the tug Tuesday near Montauk point. The tug has put out crews in an endeavor to recover them but it is feared the barges will be unable to recover from the storm.

WOMAN RUN OVER TWICE BY AUTO IN PORTLAND.
Portland, Ore., Nov. 26.—Twice run over by the same taxicab, Mrs. George W. Billings lies at her home in this city dangerously and perhaps fatally injured. Mrs. Billings in returning home late Tuesday passed between a street car and stepped in front of the taxicab. The vehicle passed completely over the woman, and as a result of the chauffeur's throwing on his reverse power the car, running backwards, again passed over the woman's body before the chauffeur could stop the machine. Mrs. Billings was badly crushed.

SHOOTS TO SUMMON AID BULLET ENTERS BREAST.
Oakland, Calif., Nov. 26.—A young man, who, according to papers on his person, is believed to be Robert DeCourselles of Paris, a member of the faculty of the Pasteur Institute, lies critically injured at Richmond, suffering from a bullet wound, said to have been fired accidentally from his own revolver. He was found at daylight yesterday lying on the ground near the California Wine association's wine haven. 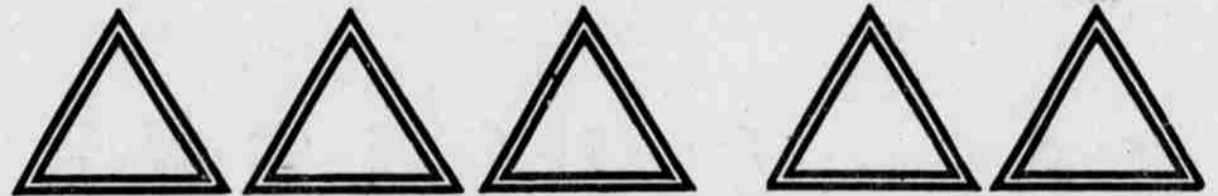

SEVEN YEARS IN PEN AND \$2,000 FINE

SENTENCE IMPOSED UPON MIKE RYAN

Appeal Made for New Trial—Attorneys Ask 30 Days to File Bill of Exceptions and Prepare Petition for Writ of Probable Cause—Ryan May Get Bail.

Michael Ryan was this morning sentenced by Circuit Judge H. J. Bean to serve seven years in the penitentiary and also to pay a fine of \$2000. Unless upon an appeal he can secure a new trial and then a verdict of acquittal he will have to suffer the penalty imposed.

As previously arranged, Ryan went before Judge Bean this morning for sentence and the above was imposed. The attorneys for Ryan then asked for 30 days in which to file a bill of

exceptions and to prepare a petition for a writ of probable cause. As soon as the trial record can be prepared by Court Stenographer Beckwith, the writ of probable cause will be asked for. Should it be granted an effort will be made to secure the freedom of the prisoner upon bail. In several past cases where men have been found guilty of manslaughter they have been admitted to freedom upon furnishing a bond of \$10,000. Ryan's attorneys also asked for a stay of execution, which was granted. Accordingly he will not be taken to the penitentiary at this time. Ryan was found guilty of manslaughter for the killing of Edward Dixon, the crime having been committed near Ryan's home in the Hudson Bay country last summer as a result of a quarrel with Dixon's employer, Shubert.

OLD OFFENDER IS AGAIN IN THE TOILS

Patrick Sullivan, said to be an old offender, is again behind the bars with a chance of going to the penitentiary. He was arrested a few months ago on a larceny charge but was finally released for want of evidence. A few days ago he was arrested a second time at Umatilla, brought to this city and lodged in jail. Yesterday he was given a hearing before Justice of the Peace Joe H. Parkes and being unable to furnish bonds is lodged in jail, where he will stay until the January term of court meets. At that time his case will be investigated by the grand jury and if indicted he will be compelled to stand trial.

Sullivan is alleged to have entered the rooms of O. R. & N. employes at Umatilla and to have taken money and clothing therefrom. He was brought to Pendleton by Detective Pluver of the O. R. & N. service. As the result of his hearing yesterday Justice of the Peace Parkes fixed his bonds at \$300, in default of which he was lodged in jail.

Skeleton Washed out of Cemetery.
Elcentro, Cal., Nov. 26.—Further developments regarding the skeleton found in a box near the town of Calceco indicate that it is that of a woman who has been dead several years. It is believed to have been unearthed by a wash in the canyon leading to the New river. There is no record of whose body it may be, but it is believed to be one of the early interments in the town's history.

NEGRO RIDDLED BY BULLETS OF MOB

Meriden, Miss., Nov. 26.—Morgan Chambers, a negro was taken from Town Marshal Broadway and Deputy Joe Camp at Mericham, 12 miles west of here last night by 200 masked men and his body riddled with bullets. The negro had earlier in the day beaten and robbed Martin Dressler, an aged citizen of Pointe, a small station two miles west of Mericham. Dressler identified his assailant. Marshal Broadway and Deputy Camp started with the prisoner for the town jail. On the way they were confronted by the mob, which took the negro by force. Marshal Broadway's check was grazed by a bullet in the scrimmage.

LANDSLIDES AND RAIN DEMORALIZES R. R. TRAFFIC

Butte, Nov. 25.—The service of the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railroad West of Missoula is completely demoralized by at least half a dozen landslides. Tons of earth and rocks cover the tracks many feet deep. The freight movement is at a complete standstill. The Northern Pacific is encountering great difficulty in operating trains on account of landslides caused by the continued rains.

WOMAN LEADER PLANS GIGANTIC PROTEST

Chicago, Nov. 25.—Mrs. Robbins, president of the Women's Trade Union league is advocating today a protest in the event that Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison are sent to jail. She plans to have a million and a half men refuse to work for a day.

Willamette Is at Standstill.

Portland, Nov. 26.—The Willamette river reached a flood stage today, but is now stationary. Many house boats were washed from their moorings and bridges were jeopardized for a time.

TERRIBLE WRECK CAUSED BY FLOODS

Spokane, Nov. 25.—A wreck on the Northern Pacific near Lind at midnight resulted in the death of Engineer Reaman, fireman Spangler, Pilot Tyler, of the Great Northern train, and probably fatally injured the engineer and fireman on the Northern Pacific helper engine. Passengers escaped without injury.

The Great Northern was using the Northern Pacific's tracks on account of the floods and washouts on the Great Northern road. The train was speeding toward Lind, where it was due at 1 o'clock, when through a mistake in orders the helper left Lind for the west. It has gone scarcely a mile when it and the passenger collided. As they struck a terrific explosion occurred, awakening the passengers. The fire was communicated to the mail, express, smoking, chair and Pullman cars, destroying them, but they did not leave the track. The passengers were warned by the explosion, and escaped. The mail portion of the express and baggage was saved.

MRS. STETSON'S TEACHINGS BROKE UP CHRISTY HOME

New York, Nov. 25.—Charging that the breaking up of her home was due to her husband's adoption of Christian Science as taught by Mrs. Stetson, who recently was excommunicated, Mrs. Christy, wife of the famous artist, is today at the home of her brother-in-law, broken in health, but determined to regain possession of her daughter Natalie, whom she alleges Christy is teaching the Christian Science cult. She said: "I love Howard and if it were not for the Christian Science as taught by Mrs. Stetson, I now would be living happily with my husband. She and her practitioners taught Howard that marriage was wrong and that nothing is sacred. He has lost all my former sympathy."

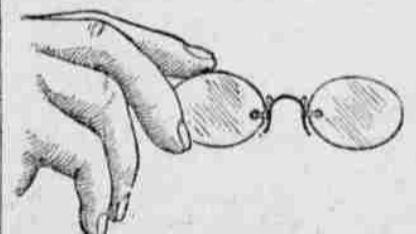
