

DEMAND FOR ALL LIVESTOCK IS GOOD

LIBERAL RUNS SHOW IN MARKET ARRIVALS

Hog Market Advances Toward Annual Improvement—Killers Complaining Because of Lack of Good Cattle—Sheep Market Is Very Firm.

Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Nov. 29.—Every branch of the local livestock market reflects favorable sentiment today.

Receipts in general were quite fair over Sunday, but in no line had this the slightest effect toward stilling the demand.

Run of hogs was surprisingly good over Sunday, there being a total of 962 head received. This compares with none a week ago, 350 head this same day in 1908, 82 head in 1907, and none on the same date in either 1905 or 1906.

As shown by all recent transactions in the Stockdale market, hogs remain in the best demand for several years. Eight dollars and 10 cents is still the price offered for best quality and former transactions indicate that this price will be continued here for a while.

Position Improves at Year Start.

As a usual rule, the position of the hog market here improves around the turn of the year, and present indications are that this season will be no exception to the rule. While better runs of hogs have been received here recently as compared with the same periods in former years, still the demand above the number of arrivals and at this time the call for swine is the greatest ever shown.

Outside packers are buying more hogs in the Portland market at this time than ever before in the history of the local yards. They have always been in the market for hogs, but formerly receipts here were so nominal that they were compelled to go elsewhere for their supplies a large portion of the time.

Cattle Supply Quite Liberal.

In the cattle market there was a very good run over Sunday, a total of 575 head being received compared with 55 head last Monday, none this day a year ago, 183 in 1907, 255 in 1906 and 186 head for the same day in 1905.

Killers are complaining about the lack of good cattle, but because of the scarcity of this quality they have been forced to pay values out of line for the poorer stuff.

No calves were received over Sunday, and that market continues its general firmness, with no change in prices.

Bringing in More Sheep.

While the run of sheep in the yards today was not quite up to that of a week ago, still the showing was somewhat better than the trade had expected.

Market for sheep stands very firm, with no change in general values.

The following is the general range of livestock values in the yards:

Cattle—Best steers, weighing 1200 pounds, \$4.55 @ 4.57, medium steers, \$4.25 @ 4.50; best cows, \$3.60 @ 3.65; best heifers, \$3.65; bulls, \$2 @ 2.75; steers, \$2.50 @ 3.

Hogs—Best east of the mountains, \$8.05 @ 8.10; stockers, \$5.50 @ 6; pigs, \$6 @ 7.

Sheep—Best wethers, \$4.50; ordinary, \$4 @ 4.25; spring lambs, \$5.25; straight ewes, \$3.50 @ 4; mixed lots, \$4.

Calves—Best, \$5 @ 5.25; ordinary, \$3.50 @ 4.50.

THE WHEAT MARKET

DECLINE IN OPTIONS FOR NEARBY DELIVERY

Cash Situation Is Poor—Foreign Market Is Weak—India Rains Influence Market.

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Continuance of weakness abroad, together with the loss in the cash premiums at home, forced a sharp decline in nearby wheat options today. Closing was 1/4c lower for December, 3-8c for May and a gain of 1-4c for the July option.

Foreign markets were weak all day, and at all points a lower price was shown at the closing. Liverpool opened 1-4 to 4-8d under yesterday and closed with a loss of 3-8 to 3-4d. Paris was easy 1-2 to 1 cent lower at the closing for wheat, and 1-2 to 3-4 cent lower for flour.

Increasing wheat supplies at primary points have caused a further cut in the premium being paid for cash wheat. A message from Kansas City said that cash people there whose wheat is shipped south and east, say the demand dropped away. In fact, this condition had prevailed for two weeks or more. Premiums are coming off and it is believed that around 500,000 bushels will be delivered the first of December.

Good rains in India influenced the markets abroad and forced the general decline.

Wheat on passage decreased 750,000 bushels, corn decreased 352,000 bushels. Russian shipments from July 1 to date are wheat, 107,165,000 bushels compared with 32,168,000 bushels last year.

SEEK UNIFORMITY IN STATE DIVORCE LAWS

New York—Uniformity in the divorce laws of the various states is being sought by President Taft and most of the state governors, according to Seth Low, who as president of the National Civic Federation has just announced the date of the conference on uniform legislation. This conference will be held in Washington on January 17-19. Representative men of every state in the Union, appointed by the governors, will attend.

Mr. Low's announcement says: "Through the initiative of the American Bar association, a special national organization of commissioners chosen by the different governors, is now working for a uniform divorce law, the supreme necessity for which grows out of the condition that a child under the various divorce laws may be legitimate in one state but illegitimate in another. The work of this special commission will be reported on at the conference and will then come before the committee of governors."

WILLAMETTE VALLEY SCHOOLS QUARREL OVER HONORS

The question as to who holds the interscholastic football championship of western Oregon this year will probably be disputed and never completely settled. The claimants for it are the Washington (Portland), and Eugene high schools, who have not played each other and have defeated all others. Eugene has a game with this school, but the latter called it off and Eugene was unable to make further arrangements for a game. The local school says the honor is theirs for Portland has lost the right by forfeiting this game. This is probably correct. Portland will claim that comparative scores give them the best of it. Eugene has written asking for a post-season game, but it is doubtful whether this will be played. However, if Washington refuses this, Eugene certainly has the right to claim the championship. A romance which dates back for years came to a climax when Tursk and Mrs. Caroline Weese eloped to Chicago a week ago and quietly were married. Mrs. Weese's first husband died on Thanksgiving day, 1908, and shortly after Tursk's sister with whom he had been living many years died. Tursk and Mrs. Weese had been acquainted for years and recently decided they would be happier if they became life companions and the plan was carried out.

Copenhagen, Nov. 29.—The mysterious disappearance of Dr. Cook is causing considerable comment here, and as a result he may lose much prestige among Copenhagen University savants who are investigating his polar records. Members of the investigating committee denied the announcement reported to have been made by them to the effect that the explorer was en route to Denmark to assist in reviewing the records. They state, however, that Cook's presence would facilitate the work. Despite the adverse criticism following the explorer's disappearance he is still regarded by laymen as the original pole discoverer and is an unquestioned favorite over Peary.


