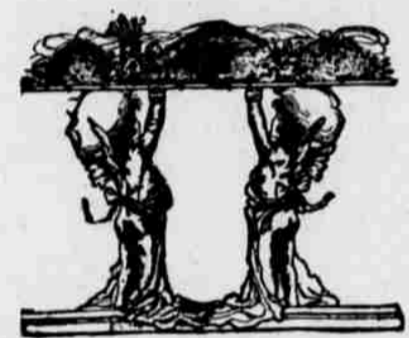

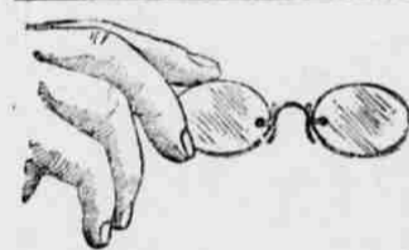

THOSE QUALIFIED TO VOTE MONDAY

RESIDENCE REQUISITES FOR CITY VOTERS

Must Have Lived in State Six Months. Within County and City 60 Days—Boundaries of Voting Precincts.

With the city election but four days off the ever-recurring questions from new residents as to the residence qualifications of voters are being asked. The qualifications are exactly like those which prevail for the state and general elections.

A man who has resided within the state six months, within the county 90 days and within the city 30 days.

The boundaries of the different voting precincts are as follows: East Pendleton, or First Ward—That portion of the city east of the center line of Vincent street and east of the same if extended north of the river.

North Pendleton, or Second Ward—That portion of the city north of Court street and west of Vincent street if the same were extended north to the river.

Pendleton, or Third Ward—That portion of the city south of Court street, west of Vincent street and east of Willow street.

South Pendleton, or Fourth Ward—That portion of the city south of Court street and west of Willow street.

The Voting Places.

Ward 1—Turner house at 810 East Court street. Ward No. 2—Sample room at 101 Water street. Ward No. 3—City hall. Ward No. 4—Building at 310 West Webb street.

CHICAGO WON'T INVITE MICHIGAN TO "BIG FIVE"

Chicago. — University of Chicago professors recently announced that they would make no move to get Michigan back into the conference or to endeavor to secure the Chicago-Michigan football game next fall.

In the first definite statements they have made on the subject of the "big five," the contemplated reunion of Michigan and Chicago and the reign of the Chicago board of physical culture and athletics said they were not in sympathy with the student movement. Michigan may return or stay out, as she prefers, the Chicago officials stated.

"Chicago, in my opinion, should not do any more than say that she would be glad to have Michigan back in the conference," said Professor Henry G. Gale of the athletic board. "If Michigan comes back she must come left that way and should come back that way. The talk about the 'big five' is unwise and seems to me that Chicago owes far more to the smaller colleges who have remained loyal all the time.

TEN THOUSAND MILE TRIP IN LAUNCH

Chicago.—A 10,000 mile trip in a thirty-six foot launch is the program mapped out for Stanley A. Beadle, who anchored off the Chicago Yacht club landing recently. Mr. Beadle started his tour Saturday night from Muskegon, Mich., and intends to return to the starting point within 12 months. His route taking him through the Illinois-Michigan canal, the Illinois and Mississippi rivers, the Gulf of Mexico, around the Atlantic seaboard to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, up the St. Lawrence river and through the great lakes back to Muskegon.

BALLINGER WINS OVER PINCHOT

TAFT PUTS LID ON FORESTRY SERVICE

Leaves Pinchot in His Position But Forbids Him to Attack Secretary of Interior—Pinchot May Accept Ultimatum.

Washington.—President Taft has put the lid down tight and hard on the forestry service and directed that in the future no official or employee of that bureau shall inspire or disseminate any story or report reflecting upon Secretary Ballinger or other officials of the interior department.

Gifford Pinchot has been notified to this effect in a letter from President Taft, and is given to understand that he will be permitted to remain at the head of the forestry service so long as he works in harmony with the administration. But two conditions are imposed: First, he must see to it that no more attacks by his men are directed at Ballinger; second, he must in all forestry matters proceed hereafter in strict accordance with the law and must desist in his former practice of legislating by regulations.

Mr. Pinchot has been deeply concerned of late over his situation and his friends indicate he will now willingly comply with the president's requirements. It is understood that the president became thoroughly satisfied that various officials of the forest service had inspired many attacks upon Mr. Ballinger and it is his foremost purpose to protect Ballinger, so far as he can, and to retain him in his cabinet in spite of the opposition of conservationists.

A WESTERN STORY OF MULE VERSUS AUTO

Here is a story from Manhattan with vaudeville features, not to mention the hard luck:

A farmer living on Deep creek, several miles east of Manhattan, had a thrilling experience with an automobile and a team of mules. The farmer recently had purchased a new machine, and on one of his first trips tried to cross the creek at the ford. He put the clutch at high speed and waded in. For some reason the engine went dead in midstream. Cranking failed to revive it. After a number of useless efforts, the farmer secured a team of mules, hitched them to the stubborn auto and dragged the machine across the creek and up the bank. The driver had left the clutch at high speed, and from some unaccountable cause as soon as the machine was on level road the engine suddenly revived, the machine started forward with a bound and struck the mules squarely in their kicking apparatus. There was something doing immediately thereafter.
