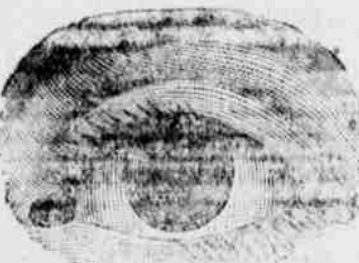

### SHEEP AND LAMBS RANGING HIGHER

PREMIUM OF 25c PAID FOR GOOD QUALITY

Situation Daily Growing Better—Good Demand for Cows—Great Many Goats Used on Puget Sound—Hogs Firm at \$8.10.

Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Dec. 1.—Further advance is shown in the sheep market as a result of the improving demand at Stockdale. Run of sheep and lambs was improved during the day, but the call is growing even faster.

For real good quality a premium of about 25c is being paid over formerly listed values. Spring lambs that are of best quality can be moved in the yards as high as \$6, according to most prominent sellers, although this price has not as yet been secured in the open transactions of the Union stockyards.

General run of lamb offerings in the yards will range around \$5.50, and this has been the highest price obtainable in the yards. Sheep and lamb situation is daily growing better and few of the late arrivals have been of top quality.

Run for the day was 503 head, compared with none a week ago, 23 a year ago, 629 two years ago, 320 head this date in 1906, and 251 head for the same date in 1905.

Demand for Cows is Best.

Of the entire cattle market, much the best demand at this time is shown for cows. Sales recently in that line have been as high as \$3.75, and additional transactions could be made at that figure without the least forcing, provided the quality was being offered. However, no transactions were reported during the 24 hours above \$3.50. This is due entirely to the lack of suitable animals for the best trade.

Total run of cattle in the yards today was small, and therefore the showing of steers was not satisfactory. Only one lot was sold and that was a very poor one and did not bring above \$4.

While the market for steers stands in a very good position, it has not as yet shown the great strength noted in the call for cows, although a change in these conditions may be daily expected.

Using Goats on the Sound. Puget sound cities are using a greater number of goats at the time. A carload which came to the local market sold to northern buyers during the past 24 hours at 2 1-2c a pound. The shipment consisted of 125 head.

Goat meat is used in some sections wherever there is a scarcity of sheep or else the price of the latter has reached very high figures. Goat meat is necessarily a cheap meat and prices paid are seldom in line with those on other animals.

Hogs Established at \$8.10.

Local market for hogs is firmly established at \$8.10 at Stockdale for the best stuff. While, according to the western market, a slightly higher price would be justified, still very little of the local stuff lately received has been of quality to demand an unusual figure.

Run of hogs for the day was quite fair and there was no change in the general standing of the market.

A year ago today there was firmness in all lines of livestock but values were unchanged.

Those Who Supply the Market.

N. Newland brought in a car of hogs from Bertha.

P. H. Farmer sent in a mixed load of sheep and hogs from McMinnville.

George Ziegler had a load of swine offering from Gervais on today's market.

Taylor & Cummins of Halsey sent in a mixed bunch of stuff. One load consisted of hogs and sheep, another of sheep and still another of goats.

T. P. Patton of Halsey brought forward a mixed load of sheep and hogs for today's market.

A. R. Ford of McMinnville, brought in two loads of sheep from Carlton.

A. J. Waterman sent in a car of calves from Echo.

J. H. Gray shipped three loads of cattle from Shaniko to Stockdale.

Cattle—Best steers, weighing 1200 pounds, \$4.55 @ 4.65; medium steers, \$4.25 @ 4.50; best cows, \$3.75; medium cows, \$3.50; bulls, \$2.00 @ 2.75; stags, \$2.50 @ 3.00.

Hogs—Best east of the mountains, \$8.10; stockers, \$5.50 @ 6.00; pigs, \$6 @ 7.00.

Sheep—Best wethers, \$4.50 @ 4.75; ordinary, \$4.50; spring lambs, \$5.50 @ 6.00; straight ewes, \$4.00 @ 4.25; mixed lots, \$4.25 @ 4.50.

Calves—Best, \$5.00 @ 5.25; ordinary, \$3.50 @ 4.50.

### THE WHEAT MARKET

CASH PREMIUM IS BEING REACHED

Minneapolis Millers Are Not Buying So Freely—Chicago Closes With Loss.

Chicago, Dec. 1.—Wheat market opened unchanged to 1-4c lower and closed 1-4c to 3-4c a bushel lower than yesterday.

Sentiment among millers is changing over to the bear side and it is noted that they have practically ceased buying in the middle west. Minneapolis millers say that the price is too high and that with the larger offerings the price of cash should continue down. Stocks of wheat at that point increased 225,000 bushels in four days.

While Liverpool market did not show much change it had considerable effect upon conditions here. Liverpool opened unchanged to 1-8d advanced and closed 1-8d lower to 1-8d higher than yesterday.

After the opening here the market drifted into a period of extreme dullness, which continued until within a few minutes of the close, when further slight changes were shown.

Corn market followed the trend in wheat and the closing was generally 1-4c lower than yesterday. Oats market fluctuated but a fraction or two all day, closing at practically the same figures as last night. Provisions sold heavily; January pork dropping to 2137 bid, as compared with 2180 yesterday, and May was down to 2055, or 25 points lower than yesterday.
