## ONE LANDS VICTORY, THE OTHER DEFEAT

CO L WINS FROM ATHENA  
ACADEMY LOSES TO MILTON

**Militia Boys Have Hard Fought Game, Winning 9 to 5—One man Causes Academics to Lose by Decisive Score—High School Team Plays at Weston Tonight.**

One victory and one defeat is the record of the performances of two Pendleton basketball teams, last evening. The Company L team took the Athena high school boys into camp by the close score of 9 to 5 while the Pendleton Academy quintet went down to defeat before the fast five of the Columbia Junior College team of Milton by 29 to 11. The games were played at Athena and Milton.

As the score would indicate, the Athena game was noticeable for the good work done by the guards on both sides and the inability of the forwards to take advantage of the few opportunities offered for "shooting" baskets. The game was closely contested from start to finish and was enjoyed by the small crowd present.

**Academy Defeated.**  
The other game was more decisive, though with the exception of one man, the two teams were quite evenly divided. The one exception was Storm, the former Weston Normal star who is playing with the Junior Collegians this year. It came near being a one man game and a one man victory for Storm was nearly "the whole show." He was so swift and sure that he clearly outlasted, not only the members of the opposing team but also his own team mates.

The game is said to have been interesting from the spectators standpoint,

however, notwithstanding the one-sided score. The Pendleton players all showed up well and will be able to give a good account of themselves in the race for the city championship.

**High School Plays Tonight.**  
The high school team will have its first game of the season with an outside team this evening when the boys go to Weston to try conclusions with the high school team at that place. Though Weston is a small town it has turned out some mighty fast ball tossers in the past and the local players are expecting a battle royal.

The game will be played on the Weston floor, the Pendleton boys having gone up on the noon train. Nat Kimball will officiate while the lineup will be as follows:

Boylan and Sturdivant, forwards; McDill, center; Devine and C. Jordan, guards; Rader, A. Jordan and Fee will comprise a strong trio of substitutes who will probably be in the game before it is over.

### WALLA WALLA GETS CONVENTION OF FARMERS

Walla Walla, Dec. 11.—Walla Walla will get the mid-winter Farmers' Cooperative and Educational meeting this year, when delegates from Washington, Oregon and Idaho will attend. This was decided on at the meeting of the executive committee held in Pullman this week. Walla Walla members who returned home Thursday consider this a special victory as a number of cities were contesting for the honor of having this body meet in their city. Between 700 and 1000 delegates will throng the city on January 17, 18 and 19, when the meeting is to be held, which is the principal one of the year. Jeffries and Jack Johnson to battle for the world's championship on the 4th of July next. Many persons will be curious to see the giant negro in action and to discuss his chances with the man who held the heavyweight crown for a greater period than that of any other champion.

The pictures of the Johnson-Ketchel fight, which will be shown at the Pastime theater next Monday and Tuesday afternoon and evening show the colored man at his best. His wonderful cleverness is displayed

throughout. He was compelled to take every advantage of it on account of the well-known punching ability of Ketchel. Round after round Johnson eluded Ketchel, the latter seemingly content to end the fight with one punch. That he did not do so was no fault of Ketchel's. In the twelfth round he lands a mighty swing to Johnson's jaw and the world's champion topples to the floor. The pictures show his manager, Willis Britt, frantically vowing to him to be careful, but Ketchel believing victory within reach, rushes in as the negro arises and is met with two swift blows that turned victory into defeat for him. Britt claims had it not been for Ketchel's eagerness, the Jeffries-Johnson match would never have been made and that Ketchel would occupy the unique position of being middle-weight, light heavyweight and heavyweight champion of the world today.
