PENDLETON HIGH WINS ANOTHER GAME

DEFEATS WESTON SCHOOL
BY DECISIVE SCORE

Handicapped by Intercollegiate Rules, Boys Retaliate by Piling up Score of 30 Against Home Team's 12—Next Game Will be With Columbia College of Milton.

By the decisive score of 30 to 12 the Pendleton high school basketball five took the Weston high into camp on the latter's floor last Saturday evening. The game is said to have been fast and hard from start to finish, but the victors completely surpassed their rivals in their ability to pass the ball. Victory was all the more sweet by reason of the fact that the Pendleton boys were compelled to play an altogether different game from the one to which they are accustomed. The intercollegiate rules were sprung on them when they arrived at Weston and they were compelled to play according to them instead of in accordance with the rules laid down in Spalding's official guide.

The heavier guards and centre of the Pendleton team made it impossible for the Weston boys to work to advantage while the local forwards were so speedy and light that they evaded their guards with comparative ease. Of the 30 points, 18 were made by McDill, eight by Rader and four by Sturdivant.

The next game played will be against the Columbia College team of Milton. This team is recognized as one of the strongest in the county and a hard game is expected. Though the P. H. S. has no coach, the ability of Captain McDill to handle his men will bring them out on top if such is possible.

The line-up will probably be the same as in the Weston game with Sturdivant and Rader, forwards; McDill center; Devine and C. Jordan, guards.

HOW THEY TREAT BOOT-LEGGERS IN EUGENE

The five men convicted of selling liquor contrary to the provisions of the local option law appeared before Justice Bryson at 10 o'clock Saturday morning and were each given the same sentence, to wit: A jail sentence of 30 days and a fine of \$100 and to pay the costs of the court. None of them have the wherewith to pay their fine so it practically amounts to a jail sentence of 120 days in the county jail, as they cannot be compelled to lay out the costs of the trial.
