ZELAYA DOWN AND OUT.

nation unjustly intervenes in our crisis, publicly providing the rebels with arms, which has only resulted in their being defeated everywhere through the heroism of our troops.

"To avoid further bloodshed and for the reason that the revolutionists have declared that they would put down their arms when I surrendered the executive power, I hereby place in the hands of the national assembly the abandonment of the remainder of my term of office, which is to be filled by a substitute of their choosing, with the hope that this will result in good to Nicaragua, the re-establishment of peace, and particularly the suspension of the hostility of the United States, to which I do not wish to give a pretext for intervention."

No War in Bluefields.
Managua, Bluefields, Dec. 17.—It is stated semi-officially today that Provisional President Estrada, and Chief Lieutenant Groat Chamorro have agreed with General Vasquez, and General Toledo, the Zelayan leaders, that there shall be no fighting in Bluefield. It is reported that the American government has been notified of their intention to keep the city outside the fighting, since the situation at Rama is unchanged.

There is much speculation today concerning the probable successor of President Zelaya. Dr. Madriz's supporters have developed an unexpected strength, but the conservative element is trying by every means to have him withdraw, as it is generally believed that his appointment by congress would result in a continuance of the revolution. If the revolutionists are successful in naming the new president, an effort will be made to confiscate a portion of Zelaya's enormous holdings. Zelaya refuses to discuss his resignation beyond declaring "it is best for the country." He bitterly condemns the United States for interference here.

Armies May Support Estrada.
New York, Dec. 17.—Following the resignation of President Zelaya of Nicaragua, it is reported at Managua today that General Vasquez, leader of the Zelayan troops near Rama, will surrender, and it is also rumored that the Zelayan and revolutionary armies would combine to support Estrada for the presidency.

FOUR LOCAL TEAMS IN ACTION TONIGHT

PENDLETON HIGH WILL PLAY COLUMBIA HERE

Both Boys and Girls of Academy Will Appear on Weston Floor Tonight—Girls of High School With Mrs. A. C. Hampton Are in Walla Walla.

Four Pendleton basketball teams will contend for supremacy tonight. One game will be played in this city, two at Weston and one at Walla Walla. The local game will be between the high school team of this city and the Columbia College team of Milton, and the game will probably be the most important of the four.

Two other games will be played at Weston and will be between the girls and boys teams of the Pendleton academy on the one hand and the girls and boys teams of the Weston high school on the other. Boys rules

will be used for both games. The fourth game will be played in Walla Walla between the girls of Pendleton and Walla Walla high schools.

Great interest is centering on the game between the junior collegian and the local high school players for the reason that the dopsters have figured out that the race for the county championship will probably be between these two aggregations. The result of the first battle will therefore be awaited with a great deal of interest.

Storm and Still, two men who starred for the Weston normal last year are both with the Milton team and they are both said to be stronger and swifter than ever. The other players are also said to be good and this reputation was borne out by the drubbing which they gave the Pendleton academy five a few days ago.

The lineup for Pendleton will be: Rader and Sturdivant, forwards; McDill, center; Devine and Jordan, guards.

The lineup of the Pendleton academy girls will be L. Norvell, F. Young and A. Tullis, forwards; M. Rogers and J. Anderson, centers; E. Raley, C. Vanderpool and M. McReynolds, guards.

For the boys, McDonald will play center, McCormack and Piper, forwards; Taylor and Norvell, guards.

of times it seemed that the California officers must have had their hands almost on him. Each time he escaped without suspecting that he was being looked for.

It seems that he had read no account of the finding of the body of Rabael and he claimed to have heard nothing concerning it until confronted with the story this morning.

He has asked for an early hearing and this will probably be granted. He was also granted permission to have an attorney just as soon as he wanted one and it is probable that after deciding on an attorney that he will change his mind, waive the preliminary hearing and appear before the grand jury.

Deputy Sheriff Wilson received a message from Sheriff Taylor this afternoon, saying he had received the message at Edgewood, California, and that he would start home at noon today. If the trains run according to schedule he will reach Pendleton tomorrow evening.

WOULD RECOGNIZE ESTRADA AND PUNISH ZELAYA

Washington, Dec. 17.—Representative Sulzer of New York today introduced in the house a resolution directing the administration to recognize Estrada as president of Nicaragua, and notify him that the United States demands the punishment of former President Zelaya.
