### INDIANS ARE MAKING CHARGES OF GRAFT

Spokane, Wash.—Coeur D'Alene Indians will testify against the Washington Water Power company in the overflow land case to occupy the federal court at Coeur D'Alene Monday. The Indians of the reservation are unsatisfied with \$1.25 per acre settlement for land flooded by the Post Falls, Idaho, dam. Clarence Butler, an educated Indian from near St. Maries on the St. Joe river, declares that Superintendent Worley is the national protector of the Indians and that Alighting Agent Louis made affidavits that the flooded land was worth but \$1.25 per acre, when the fact is the Indians raise as high as 400 sacks of potatoes from an acre, and in one instance made \$300 from an acre of peppermint raised as an experiment. The Indians unanimously declare there is a graft connected with the case.

### INROADS WORRY FRANCE.

American Invasion Proves Blow to Commerce of Gay Republic. Paris.—France is again plunged into woe because of the "American invasion" and the newspapers are joining in a cry of "wolf," lest France's commerce be seriously hit because of the growing favor of American goods for common use among the people to the neglect of National manufactures. Figaro started the cry, possibly with sensational intent. Statistics came to its support in such volume

that other newspapers were forced to take it up, and now it is sounding from one end of the country to the other. The first count in the indictment is that the people are taking to American shoes. Almost weekly new shops appear to handle only the American article. Roller skating is another invasion. American companies have opened four big rinks this season. It is reported that Frank Bostock, who owned the hippodrome, has taken the Paris Zoo in order to remodel it on American lines. American hotels are coming into view and American patent medicines are sold everywhere.

### REAL TRUTH ABOUT BUDGET.

Tories Saw Chance to Weaken Liberal Party. London.—At this moment, when the lords assert that the budget has been refused because of its revolutionary proposals, it is interesting to recall that early in the summer the reason given for its threatened rejection was not its Socialism, but that it did not provide sufficient money for Dreadnoughts. It was on the imperial safety cry that the Tories were relying for their justification.

When this cry was taken from them they were not long in finding another. The real truth is that the budget was thrown out because it was the only way open to the Tories of weakening the Liberal party and opening up a prospect of a return to office for themselves. The Tories regard office in this country as their special and ex-

clusive perquisite, and any Liberal or Radical who happens to fill a ministerial position and draw a handsome salary is held by them to be an interloper who has no right to be there. They have now been out of office four years, and during that time they have been unable to do anything for their friends or relatives at the public expense, which is an intolerable state of things to them.

## KING EDWARD IS "MAN ON HORSEBACK"

HIS DECISION MUST SOLVE PRESENT CRISIS

Radicals Swear by Patriot King—Tories Swear to Him—Peers Usurp Royal Power and Defy King's Might—Edward May Retaliate by Creating New Peers.

London.—The interest in the general election becomes more and more absorbing and the probability is increasing that the king will be the proof of the whole struggle.

At present the radicals are more royalists than the king; it is possible that in February they may revert to the attitude of their ancestors of the Cromwellian age. But for banning or blessing Edward VII is emerging as the "man on horseback," upon whose decision the resolution of the crisis depends. The radicals are all swearing by the patriot king. The Tories are swearing to him, for expressing regret in his speech from the throne that the supplies voted by his faithful commons were rendered unavailable by the rejection of the budget.

But if after the election the king refuses to make every liberal agent to the tune of 500, a peer of the realm for the purpose of overawing the house of lords, then the boat will be on the other leg and the Tories will bless and the radicals curse their sovereign lord and king.

### Topsy-Turviners in Politics.

For the moment the radicals are all royalists. A pamphlet has just been sent to press containing the several counts upon which the 350 peers who rejected the budget ought to be treated as rebels and traitors to the crown. To refuse supplies is the last step but one before armed rebellion.

The peers usurped the authority of the commons in order to refuse the king supplies which he needed for the government and defense of his realm. They encroached upon the royal prerogative of dissolving parliament; they exposed to the world the importance of the crown; they broke down the balance wheel of the constitution and generally committed enough treason to justify their execution at Tower Hill. The king's scepter is the trenchon of democracy. Without the king the commons are powerless, face to face with the usurpation of the peers. His ministers are at present contemplating resigning office if after the election he should refuse to make 500 brand new peers, whose votes would enable them to pass their budget, to restore the absolute control of finance to the commons and to abolish the veto of the peers.

### Wholesale Creation of Peers.

There is every probability that the king will refuse such a wholesale creation of peers unless there is a veritable landslide in the radical direction. In that case Mr. Balfour would come in and there would be another general election hard on the heels of the first, in which the conservatives would appeal to the constituencies to resist radical attempts to dictate to our gracious sovereign lord and king.

Fortunately there is no need for so disastrous an annual climax. There is only one way out of the present impasse, and that is for the king to exercise his ancient, traditional prerogative to refuse to issue writs of summons with contempt, and to fill up the vacancy by summoning to the house of lords good men and true, who will be simply lords for the duration of this parliament. It is objected that this is a strong step to take. The answer is that we are fighting a revolution on which is taking for greater liberty with constitutional usage. It is necessary to fight revolution by revolution. You cannot make omelette without breaking eggs, and we shall never get out of the present impasse unless the king can be made to use his prerogative to make the will of the commons prevail.

### MARRIED TOO SOON AFTER HIS DIVORCE

Lewiston, Idaho.—Because he violated the Idaho statutes, which provide that a divorced person cannot remarry until six months has elapsed after the decree is secured, George Riley, a farmer, is in the county jail here awaiting the arrival of an officer to take him back to Idaho county. Riley is alleged to have committed perjury in swearing that he had been divorced more than six months, when it has been only a little more than 30 days since he got his divorce. He was arrested today by a deputy from Sheriff Welker's office in the Garden Gulch district.

### AUTOMOBILE ROAD TO CROSS MONTANA

Billings, Mont.—To consider the question of building a state highway which will cross Montana from North Dakota to Idaho, call for a convention to be held in this city June 1 and 2 will be made through the medium of the chamber of commerce. The matter was introduced at a meeting of the business men by W. B. George and met with favorable response.

Mr. George pointed out that Montana is sadly in need of better roads, and that from the standpoint of tourist travel by automobile alone the state loses fully \$1,000,000 each year, to say nothing of the benefits which would accrue to farmers who could deliver their products to market at a minimum expense.
