AMERICANS GRILLED BY FRAU VON ENDE

GIVES IMPRESSIONS OF NEW YORK SOCIAL LIGHTS

Declares Helen Gould and Mrs. Russell Sage Are Not Philanthropists But Are Merely Trying to Re-establish Besmirched Family Reputation—Sets European Civilization Above American.

Berlin.—A sensational book by Frau Von Ende, a German-American author, is just recently published. In it she gives her impressions of New York society and millionaires.

Frau Von Ende says politely that Miss Helen Gould and Mrs. Russell Sage are not really sincere philanthropists; that by their gifts to charities they are striving to restore the reputation of their families "besmirched by the unscrupulousness" of the father of the one and the husband of the other.

"Even the libraries which Andrew Carnegie endows cannot undo the damage he has done in his money-making career," Frau Von Ende thinks. She says New York is becoming "un-Americanized," partly because the children of New York's millionaires are educated in Europe and getting their ideas of true civilization from Europe. Another cause is the existence of vast colonies of foreigners in New York, people who not even the social settlement workers can convert into good American citizens.

"Frau Von Ende undertakes to explain why so many American heiresses marry foreign noblemen. She says American heiresses do not get an American education. Their brothers go to American colleges and are imbued with the American spirit and remain in touch with American feeling, but the girls are taught by French and German governesses and are brought up amid surroundings which are supposed to imitate those in which cultivated Europeans live. Oftenest the furniture and paintings in their father's mansions are mere imitations made by unscrupulous European dealers, but still they are capable of affecting the girl's view of life and what is most desired in it.

"So, when American girls and marriageable men meet in a drawing room they have nothing in common. The young women feel the need of European civilization. They are expatriated even before they make their first voyage to Europe," says Frau Von Ende.

She says that if New York wishes to remain genuinely American, it must return to the simplicity it enjoyed before its millionaires began to buy pseudo antique furniture and fake paintings.

NEW WIRELESS "PHONE" FOR THE EIFFEL TOWER

Paris.—The announcement that a wireless telephone service was to be established between the Eiffel tower and New York is inexact. The officers and engineers attached to the wireless telegraph station in the Eiffel tower have made the following statement:

"The American inventor, Lee de Forest, asked the military authorities to permit him to install his apparatus in the tower. After a full investigation this permission was re-

fused. However, De Forest was informed that the Eiffel tower would gladly receive any radio telegrams he might send from New York."

So far the record for the wireless telephoning is held by Lieut.-Major Orana of the Italian navy. He has spoken 250 miles. It is said the reason the French government refused the American inventor permission is that it long has been secretly perfecting a wireless telephone which is due to the invention of Captains Francque and Bennett of the army. Experiments already have succeeded and the apparatus is now being put in the tower. It will be complete in four or five months and will enable verbal communication with French stations in America and French ships at sea.

PRIEST'S NEW TELEGRAPH

Italian Invents Pocket Instrument for Use in the Field.

Milan.—Mgr. Cerebotani, an Italian priest, famous for his numerous inventions in connection with field telegraphy and telephony, has now invented a telegraphic transmitter and receiver which can be carried comfortably in a pocket. It will be known as the Cerebotani pocket telegraph. Experts believe that the invention will revolutionize field work especially for military purposes. The invention can be attached to any wire.
