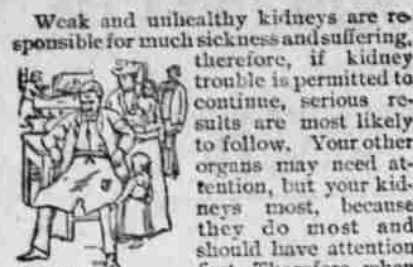

Weehawken Opposes Merger. New York, Dec. 28.—It is likely that the project to create another metropolis over in Jersey will hit a snag tonight, when the votes cast by the sovereign voters of Weehawken are counted. It is proposed to consolidate Weehawken, North Bergen, Union Hill, West Hoboken, West New York and Guttenburg into one municipality, under the name of Hudson City. All of the other towns apparently favor the proposition, but the Weehawkenites are firm against it, and local prophets assert that the project will be defeated 4 to 1 in today's election. Weehawken already has all the modern improvements, but some of the other towns are not so fortunate, and it is feared that the Hudson City merger would result in a considerable increase in taxes for improving the streets and sewers.
