

STRENGTH SHOWN IN ALL LINES OF STOCK

BUYERS WILLING TO TAKE UP GOOD STUFF

Though Not Disposed to Hurry Sales, Are Willing to Acquire High Grade Stock—No Weakness Apparent in Any Line.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Dec. 27.—It was the day after, in the livestock market today. There was little stuff in evidence in the various pens and naturally buyers have scarcely awakened and were not very active.

One peculiar feature of the present situation in the livestock market at this time is the strength displayed in all lines. No weakness is apparent today in any line although it cannot be said that buyers are inclined to rush purchases.

While there was a fair showing (in numbers) of hogs for such a day as this, practically all the hogs that came were of the feeder class. Nevertheless there was not the slightest sign of weakness even in this line although such a condition had been expected by the trade in general.

Three loads of cows formed the total showing in the cattle market during the day and these brought about the same price as had been quoted previous to Christmas.

Those Who Supply the Market. T. B. Long was in with a load of hogs from Ontario.

R. C. Milk had three loads of cattle and calves offering from Nampa, Idaho, on today's market.

Today's run of livestock compares with this day in recent years as follows:

A year ago today the cattle market was firm and prices were advanced 25c over the previous list. Other lines were firm at unchanged prices.

Cattle—Best steers, weighing 1200 pounds, \$4.75 @ 4.80; medium steers, \$4.50; best cows, \$3.15 @ 3.25; fancy heifers, \$3.75 @ 3.85; medium cows, \$3.50; poor cows, \$2.00 @ 2.50; bulls, \$2.00 @ 2.75; stags, \$2.50 @ 3.00.

Hogs—Best east of the mountains, \$5.75 @ 5.85; fancy, \$5.45; stockers, \$4.60 @ 4.70.

Sheep—Best wethers, \$5.25 @ 5.50; ordinary, \$5.00; spring lambs, \$5.00; straight ewes, \$4.75; mixed lots, \$4.75 @ 5.00.

Calves—Best, \$5.25 @ 5.50; ordinary, \$3.00 @ 4.50.

THE WHEAT MARKET

ARMOUR'S BUYING SENDS CHICAGO MAY WHEAT UP

Option Only One to Show Loss at the Start—Closing 1 5-8 Up for December.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—Wheat opened 1-8c lower to 1-2c higher and closed 1-8c to 1 5-8c above the previous closing.

Armour bought considerable of the May and brought this option from the bear side. It was the only one to show a loss at the start and the short covering was therefore effective.

World's shipments of wheat were 12,093,000 bushels; corn, 2,966,000 bushels. Wheat on passage increased 2,048,000 bushels; corn increased 837,000 bushels. Italian shipments of wheat were 75,000 bushels.

American grain visible supply: Wheat—Decreased 657,000 bushels. Corn—Increased 769,000 bushels. Oats—Decreased 414,000 bushels.

The Ticker says: Argentine cable here says it is raining hard; good for corn but is delaying harvest. Wheat receipts are light so far.

Contracted wheat in sample market is in excellent demand but there is no call for other sorts. Cash corn 1-4c to 1-2c higher. Cash oats steady to 1-4c higher.
