

COWS ARE STILL HOLDING STRENGTH

ARE SELLING IN MARKET AT \$3.75

Madro Livestock Market As Firm—Hogs Only Arrivals in 24 Hours—Pigs Sell As High As \$7—Sheep and Lambs Scarce.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Ore., Dec. 28.—The only showing of livestock in the yards today consisted of 923 head of hogs. The market for swine continues to show excellent form and sales were made during the past 24 hours as high as \$3.75. One lot that averaged 239 pounds brought this figure.

Strength of the swine market is amply shown by the very liberal values obtainable for common stock. Pigs sold in the yards as high as \$7. One lot of 39 head that averaged 64 pounds brought this figure.

Cattle Holding Steady. Market for cattle is holding steady in the yards and cows, which formed the only arrivals in that line recently, have been moved as high as \$3.75. Three loads were sold during the past 24 hours at this price.

Demand for calves remains good, and sales are still being made at the former range.

No sheep and lambs were marketed and that ranch of the local market is nominal.

Those That Supply the Market. W. B. Kurtz had two loads of hogs offering from Huntington today.

Jack Craig came in with a load of hogs from Hanson, Idaho.
