Paris.-The relative practicability of dirigible balloons and aeroplanes in war in the future, is the theme of intense discussion following a letter from Baron d'Estournelles de Conparliamentary group favoring international arbitration, to General Bruin, minister of war.

The letter calls attention to the fact that France is far behind other countries in the development of military aeronautics. The senator's warning has been taken up by the National Aerial league, which has pointed out to the aerostatic commission of the chamber the pitiful position of France as compared with Germany, France's solitary "Ville de Paris" contrasting

The minister of war says dirigibles would be augmented so that in 1911 France would have "a satisfactory
