

LAMBS ADVANCE 25 CENTS IN MARKET

EMPIRE MARKET IS GOOD AT STOCKDAYE

Sheep and Lambs Show Greatest Demand—Other Lines Have Limited Call—Highest Hog Values in Country Paid in Portland.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Dec. 30.—There remains a very firm tone in all lines of livestock but sheep are showing the greatest demand. In other lines there is only a limited call—as is usual just before the year turns—although at this time prices are being maintained as well as when business was lively.

Selected lambs are now quoted at \$6.25, or an advance of 25c over former prices. Sale at this price was made during the day, although the stock had not been weighed up in time for publication. The entire sheep and lamb market is stronger than ever before and present indications are for an advance of about 25c all through that line.

No Hogs in During the Day. There were no arrivals of hogs in the stockyards during the 24 hours, but some of the former arrivals were sold. Absence of real top quality stuff is shown in the yards at this time, and this accounts fully for the lack of record values. Considering the quality, present arrivals of hogs at Stockdale are bringing fully 25c above any price quoted in any other market in the country.

Only a few head of cattle and calves came forward. Demand for calves is very good; likewise for cattle. Former prices are being maintained.

Those Who Supply the Market. Pittock & Leadbetter sent in a mixed load of cattle and calves from their mill at Washougal, Wash.

Frank Wann, the Canby shipper, was represented in today's transactions by a load of sheep.

W. L. Skipton had a load of hogs from Salem this morning.

BALLINGER RULES AGAINST ENTRYMAN

La Grande, Ore.—Secretary of the Interior Ballinger has handed down an appealed decision from the La Grande land office in the case of Newton against Byrkit, over a timber and stone claim in Wallows county. The local land office decided, in a hearing here, that Newton was a bona fide squatter at the time Mr. Byrkit made his filing. Following the line-up at the land office some time ago, a long series of suits were started over what is known as the 4-41 cases. Byrkit, a prominent business man of this city, appealed to the next highest authority and lost, appealing again to the secretary. He now has recourse to the federal courts, but the land office department has finished with the case.

THE WHEAT MARKET

DECEMBER WHEAT MOVES UP TO \$1.19

Good Gain Made Early in Chicago With Very Small Contract Deliveries.

Chicago, Dec. 30.—Wheat opened 1-8 to 1-2c higher and closed with an advance of 3-8 to 7-8c over yesterday.

Strength abroad was an influence of note in the making of the wheat market here today. Liverpool opened 1-4d above yesterday and closed with a net advance of 1-8 to 1-1-8d.

What caused most of the strength in today's market was the nominal deliveries being made in the wheat pit. The trade had been led to believe that deliveries on the December contract would be among the heaviest in years, but so far as present indications are concerned, the rumors were false. Today's deliveries were but 30,000 bushels.

December was the strongest option during most of today's trading, but it closed with the smallest advance. December went to \$1.18@1.18 3-4 at the opening, but did not hold its early advance. Weakness developed with the early and December was carried down to the low mark at \$1.17 1-4. During the later session the market advanced to \$1.19, but lost 3-4c of this previous to the closing.

Minneapolis says the cash wheat market there is dull again, and it is very hard to sell wheat. No. 1 northern was going today 1-2 to 1c over May.
