Nathan Evans preaching the funeral discourse and the interment taking place at Walla Walla Saturday, January 8, in the family lot. Part of the relatives who were unable to attend at Walla Walla returned here Saturday, while those who went to Walla Walla returned home Sunday.

Walter Thorne of this place, is visiting with his mother at Weston, having stopped off there on his return from the funeral of his aunt at Walla Walla.

FOREIGN CAPITAL WILL IRRIGATE WESTERN LAND

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 13.—Officers of the Quincy Valley Water Users' association announce that foreign capital is ready to finance a project to irrigate 200,000 acres of semi-arid lands in Grant county, near Quincy and Ephrata, Wash., west of Spokane. The cost of the work is estimated at \$20,000,000. The association has just filed on rights for 10,000 cubic feet of water a second to be taken from the Pend d'Oreille river near Newport, Wash., 46 miles north of Spokane. The water is to be conveyed by flume and tunnel to the Little Spokane valley to a point below Milan,

thence to Quincy, nearly 200 miles. The engineering work involves the construction of a tunnel of six miles from a point near Wolford to the valley, while another big undertaking will be the construction of an aqueduct across the Little Spokane river. The flow of the Pend d'Oreille river ranges from 40,000 to 1000,000 cubic feet a second, according to the season, and the taking of water during the growing period will not greatly lower the stream. The completion of the irrigation plant means a district capable of supporting 200,000 persons.

EXPLAINING THE DEFICIT.

The reason why the United States government is losing millions of dollars every year in the postoffice department, while the express companies are piling up enormous dividends, is partially explained by the following figures:

The charge from New York to Boston on first class freight matter is 35 cents a hundred; on express it is 50 cents a hundred and on mail it is 89 cents a hundred. From New York to Atlanta, Ga., the first class freight charge is \$1.25 a hundred; the express charge is \$2 a hundred and the mail charge is \$3.50 a hundred. From New York to Chicago the charge is 75 cents a hundred for first class freight, \$1.25 for express and \$3.55 for mail. The charge from New York to San Francisco is \$3 a hundred for first class freight, \$6.75 for express and \$13.28 for the mails.

COSTERS WARBLE FOR PRIZE DONKEY

HUMOR AND PATHOS SEEN IN LONDON COMPETITION

Mongers of St. Luke's Give Concert for Benefit of Sick Comrade in Which Long Eared Beast Is Principal Prize—Apples, Oranges and Other Wares Put Up.

London.—Through the narrow streets where the coster barrows line up in the gutter, a donkey was led slowly by a proud small boy who announced a singing competition at the top of his voice. Large bills hanging on the donkey's back added the information that the patient animal was one of the many valuable prizes offered in a grand amateur singing contest at St. Mary's Schools in Golden Lane, E. C. The concert was "on behalf of Brother Michael Coster, who, having had the misfortune to fall in business, is now in need of your kind assistance," and was "under the auspices of the St. Luke's Costermongers' and General Dealers' Sick and Burial society."

The long, low school room was packed to suffocation. When the curtain rose on the tiny stage it revealed the full riches of the prize list. The donkey himself was still acting as publicity agent in the streets, but for all eyes to see were the basket of apples, the sack of potatoes, the case of oranges, the blankets, the crust and the other prizes that awaited the successful vocalist.

Stewards wearing the blue and gold scarfs of the Costers' society kept order. Their method was effective. If a baby cried, or a man spoke above a whisper they all bawled "Order, please!" so loudly that the interrupting note was drowned, together with all efforts of the singer of the moment.

There were twenty-two lady competitors and thirty-one gentlemen, and they gave pathos, comedy and sentiment in big, satisfying portions. "My little one's dying, I cannot sing tonight," was the general idea of the opening song by a very earnest lad, and then came the others in the order in which their names had been drawn out from a hat.

SEAT SALE ON FOR "THE LAND OF NOD"

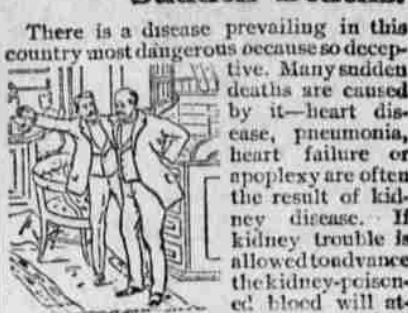
