LABOR FEDERATION EN-DORSES WOMEN SUFFRAGE

Hoquiam, Wash., Jan. 12.—Today's session of the Washington state federation of labor was devoted almost entirely to addresses. Mrs. Dr. Johnson's address in which she advocated the necessity of organizing woman's trade unions throughout the state was enthusiastically received. Organizer Ross, of the bakers union, advocated the appointment of an inspector for

bakers and candy makers. A letter was read to the convention from Mrs. Emma Smith Devoe, of Seattle, enclosing the following resolution: "Resolved that the federation pledge itself to the enfranchisement of women." Following a number of speeches favoring such action, the convention adopted the resolution unanimously. The boom was launched yesterday of President C. R. Case of Seattle, for congress and is meeting with great favor.

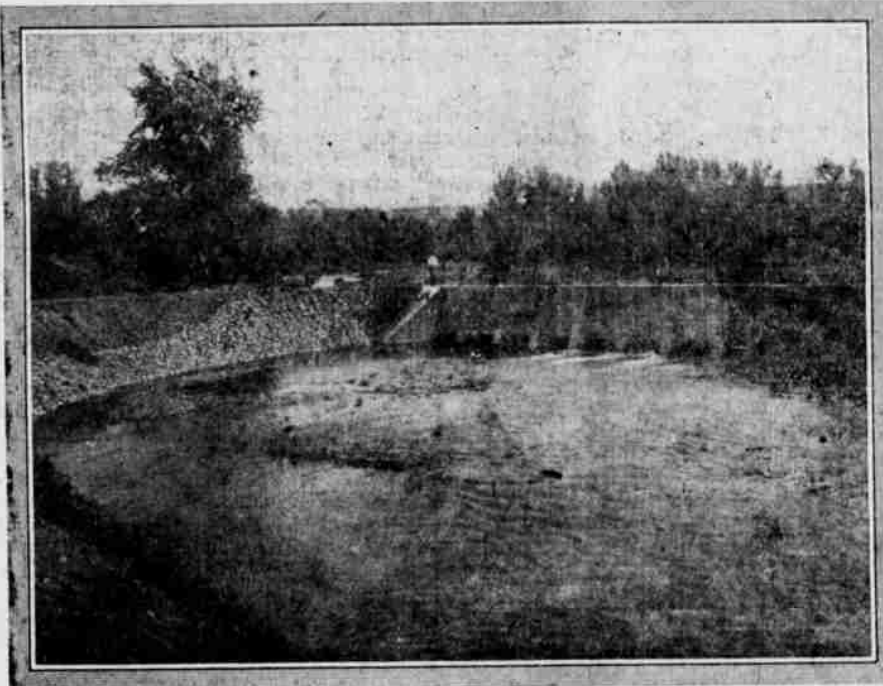

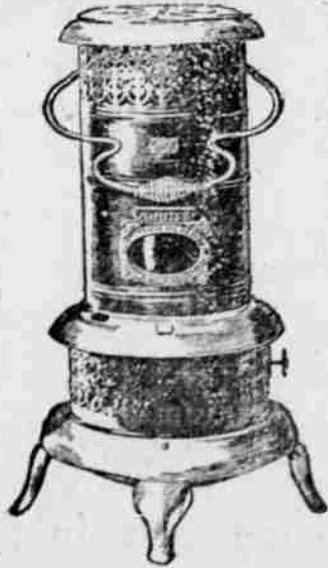
