CALVES MAKE AN ADVANCE OF 50C

ONE SALE AT \$6.00 RECORDED IN MARKET

Cattle Prices Firm at High Mark—Steers Good for \$5.25—Hog Market Firm at \$9.20.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Jan. 12.—Cattle prices are firm, and an advance of 50c is being quoted for calves this morning. A sale was made during the day at \$6. The animal weighed 180 pounds. That calves will sell even higher within the near future is indicated by the trend of the present market. Unless there is a radical change in livestock quotations it is not likely that many calves will enter this market, because even at this time the dressed meat market stands firm at 12 1/2 to 13 a pound. The difference between the live and dressed quotations is too great to continue unless livestock interests are bent upon throwing the arrivals into the front street markets.

All through the market for cattle prices were very firm, and several sales were made during the early trading around \$5.25 for good steers. Some California stuff arrived this morning and was in good condition.

Sheep and Lambs Firm. It looks rather queer to the local livestock trade that Oregon, one of the principal sheep states in the country, is forced to send away from home to secure even a small supply of mutton. This is a fact, however. Most of the sheep that have recently entered the market in good condition came from Montana.

Lambs are now firmly established at \$6.25 for best stuff, and more sales could be made at the high figure if the stuff was offering.

The hog market is firm at \$9.20, the record price mentioned yesterday. As was told at that time, several sales were made at the record.

The following is the general range of livestock prices in the yards:

- Cattle—Best steers, weighing 1200 pounds, \$5.25; medium steers, \$4.75 @ 5; best cows, \$4 @ 4.25; fancy heifers, \$4.00 @ 4.25; medium cows, \$3.75 @ 4; poor cows, \$3; bulls, \$2.50 @ 3.25; stags, \$2.50 @ 3.
- Hogs—Best east of the mountains, \$9.10 @ 9.20; fancy, \$9 @ 9.05; stockers, \$7.50; pigs, \$7.
- Sheep—Best wethers, \$5.25 @ 5.50; ordinary, \$5; spring lambs, \$6 @ 6.25; straight ewes, \$4.75; mixed lots, \$4.75 @ 5.
- Calves—Best, \$5.75 @ 6; ordinary, \$5 @ 5.25.

A STUDIO ROMANCE.

Sculptor Davidson to Wed His Model Pretty Yvonne Kerstrat.

Paris.—Joe Davidson is a young Russian immigrant who was found on the East Side of New York by Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, who recognized his signs of talent and sent him to Paris, where he has become a distinguished sculptor. On each of her trips to Paris Mrs. Whitney goes to the Latin quarters to encourage her

protege. His latest work is a life-sized statue of Yvonne de Kerstrat, a young woman who recently returned from New York to visit her brother, Count de Kerstrat. Today the sculptor announces his early marriage to his charming model, which is the proper ending to a studio romance. Mlle. de Kerstrat appeared on the stage in America with Henry Miller's company and afterward set up as a fashionable modiste on Fifth avenue.

Her brother, who is an authentic count, is one of the figures of the Latin quarters. He and Frederick H. Burlingham, the American writer, were together on that famous trip wearing sandals, when they were suspected of being Artist Steinheil's murderers. They had no difficulty in demonstrating their innocence, but their eccentricities of dress have long been the talk of the Latin quarters. Davidson and his young wife will go to America, where an exhibition of his work will be held. He says the statue for which his bride posed represents "Art's Conquest of Nature and Destiny."

M'WHORTER DENIES RUMOR ABOUT HIS NEW COMPANY

Denying that the Pacific Telephone company or any other concern is backing the Inter-state company which recently took over the Butter creek system, R. H. MacWhorter, the secretary of the consolidated system, announced this morning that the company is planning some important extensions.

According to the secretary a switchboard is being installed at Stanfield and the new exchange is to be in operation by Saturday or Monday. The next move of the company will probably be the installation of an exchange at Heppner. At present the company has connections with the Pacific company at Heppner but has no exchange at that point.

When it was stated to Mr. MacWhorter that it was rumored that the Pacific Telephone company was financing the new company, the secretary replied that no one who knew him would ever believe any such statement. He said he had been fighting the Pacific company too long to change over and make friends with them now.

LIBERALS' SCHEME FAILS.

Attempt to Drag Whitlaw Reid Into Dispute Avails Naught. London.—The effect to drag Whitlaw Reid, United States Ambassador to Great Britain, who is now on the high seas en route to America, into

the Parliamentary contest has fallen flat. It is a mere tempest in a teapot. The Liberals thought to make another "Sackville case" out of it. Sir Charles Walpole, who sponsored the publication of Mr. Reid's letter in a circular in behalf of Donald McMaster, unionist candidate for the Chertsey division of Surrey, in an effort to puncture the Liberals' contention that the protective tariff caused, extensive poverty, and unemployment in the United States, kept himself hidden.

The letter was written a year ago last December. It was merely a courteous reply to a supposed bona fide inquiry by Mr. McMaster as to the real conditions in the United States. A general election was then not thought of. There is no chance of international complications, even though the Liberals threatened to invoke the Foreign Affairs Department as to the alleged "interference" of American diplomats in the English election.

A CYCLE FOR THE AIR.

Man-Propelled Aeroplane Built by a British Inventor. London.—A man-propelled aeroplane is the latest invention which has been brought to an accomplished fact.

The total area of the machine is 100 square feet, and it weighs about fifty pounds. The length of wings from tip to tip is 20 feet. The propeller can be worked to give 600 revolutions in the air by a process of pedalling, as on an ordinary cycle, and when in the air a descent can easily be made at the desire of the aerial cyclist.

The ends of the wings are movable and are controlled from a handbar by wires, which it is claimed, will easily control the machine in flight. The tail is also moved in the same way. The shape of the aeroplane resembles that of a bird, and a running start is necessary on the summit of rising ground.
