

HIGH VALUES ARE STILL MAINTAINED

GOOD STUFF SHOWING QUITE EXTENSIVE DEMAND

Firmness Shown in All Lines of Livestock—Hogs Steady With \$9.25 for Toppers—Lively Talks.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stock sale, Jan. 20.—Firmness is shown in all lines of livestock today in the Stockdale yards, and prices are being maintained.

Receipts for the early market were very small and consisted of but 60 hogs and 69 cattle, but a small additional lot was expected later in the day.

Top hogs are firm at \$9.25 and selected steers will move at the top, although there is more discrimination in this branch of the livestock market than formerly.

No sheep have arrived and none have entered the market since last Saturday, when 263 head appeared. Market is therefore firm.

Those Who Supply the Market. A. R. Ford, the "regular" from McMinnville, was in with a load of hogs. T. R. Hewitt drove in 25 head of cattle from the country.

S. E. Graham had a load of cattle from Enterprise offering in the yards today.

Robert Deal sent in a car of cattle from La Grande.

A year ago today, while cattle were weak, 10 to 15c lower, other lines of livestock were firm at unchanged prices.

Lively on Livestock Show. In an interview with the Denver Post D. O. Lively, general agent of the Portland Union Stockyards company, says:

"Denver has a great show, something of which any city on earth might well be proud. This city owes much to the devotion to a cause and the bigness of the imagination, as well as to the ability of the man who has built up the important enterprise that Denver and the entire west is now enjoying.

"I know something of the work it entails and nothing should be too good for Colonel W. E. Skinner, to whom a great part of the credit is due.

"We attended the meeting of the National Wool Growers' association at Ogden and are much gratified over the selection of Portland for the 1911 meeting. It was a big convention and its deliberations were in keeping with its scope as a national body, Portland, by the way, must be taken into consideration these days as a central livestock market. Our new union stockyards, new packing house, the rapid increase in population, new railroads, and the fact that Denver, 1200 miles distant, is our nearest competitor, make for the growth of our market.

"The people of the west are lending the new market loyal support, and with the advent of a livestock show patterned after the Denver success, we expect to go ahead with speed. We have a downhill haul from a great empire of livestock raising possibilities and besides our own people we have the orient, Central America, South America, the Pacific islands and Alaska as a distributing ground for our packing house products."

W. H. Daughtrey, president of the Stockyards, and C. C. Cold of the Union Meat company, were with Mr. Lively at Denver, and later went to Chicago.

THE WHEAT MARKET

WHEAT IN CHICAGO PIT CLOSES HIGHER

Opens Slow and Weak But Better Toward End of Day's Trading.

Argentine Harvest Progress.

Buenos Ayres, Argentina, Jan. 20.—According to a prominent exporter here 500,000 acres of wheat were harvested this year. The exportable surplus is placed at 64,000,000 bushels.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Wheat opened weak and lower, and closed 1-4 to 1-2c a bushel higher than yesterday.

Foreign markets were firm early, but showed weakness toward the closing. Liverpool opened 1-4 to 3-8d higher, and closed 1-2 to 7-8d lower than yesterday.

During the morning the selling of wheat was very much of the same character as for several days past. Before the closing, however, there was a decided change in the tone of the trade, and not only were the early declines recovered, but the close was at a substantial gain.
