New York, Jan. 26.—The Christmas holidays had no sooner closed than the dry goods merchants began displaying the earlier consignments of linen and cotton dress goods.

It was bitterly cold outside, but I found many women in heavy furs at the exhibit giving their orders as they passed from aisle to aisle.

My first stop was made before a table on which was displayed a heavy cotton fabric in a coarse canvas weave in uneven threads like those in the pongees.

Close beside the canvas weaves were some excellent examples of Himalaya cloth and a design for this material was shown me by a visiting dressmaker.

My second halt was made among some English novelties for which no special name seems to have been found; they closely resemble some of the wool mixtures, having self-colored silk designs.

The rose pattern still obtains among the organdies. There were some lovely dressed patterns shown in both the French and the domestic organdies.

For the semi-tinted dresses there are the cotton poplins, creases, cotton pongees. The new crash weaves are in effect coarse, but in reality are extremely supple and soft with a mercerized finish.

The cotton or mercerized foulards which copy so well the real material was not to be confounded with the

material once known under this name. The new goods has more body. It is supple and comes in nearly every design used for silk variety.
