

# STEERS TAKE SHORT DROP IN STOCKDALE

BEST QUALITY SELLS 10 CENTS LOWER TO \$5.65

Several Sales of Extra Good Quality Made at Lower Prices in Yards—Hogs and Sheep Are Firm.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Feb. 15.—Market for cattle was quoted slow during the past 24 hours, according to official announcement made by the Portland Livestock Exchange.

The liberal run of cattle in the yards yesterday had a depressing effect upon buyers and therefore their wants were all too easily supplied.

Top for extra good steers in the yards during the past 24 hours was \$5.65, or 10c below the high value reached several days ago, when the new high record for the season was made. Several sales at \$5.65 were made during the day and some very good quality was shown. Sales of good steers were made down as low as \$5, although others of this quality were made up to \$5.40.

Cows sold in the yards during the past 24 hours up to \$4.60, although the quality was merely good, not first-class. The fact that there have been few arrivals of cows recently, is a help to that branch of the cattle market, although it is not likely that sales will be made in this line at a price greater than \$1 less than the price of best steers.

There was no run of cattle in the yards during the past 24 hours and if this is continued for awhile it will in all probability have a stiffening effect upon values. Absence of arrivals in the yards today was not felt by the trade because buyers' wants have been well filled recently.

Fact that no hogs have been received in the Portland stockyards for nearly a week, is holding that market very firm and therefore it seems to be the general opinion of the trade that former top quotations will be easily continued. While the local market is generally boosted or compressed by the height of values in the east and middle west, and very limited arrivals will scarcely be affected by that condition at present.

Sheep quotations are steady at present, with no sales reported.

## THE WHEAT MARKET

### FOREIGN MARKETS SHOW ADVANCES YESTERDAY

All Are Bullish But Chicago Has Spell of the Blues and Falls to Hold Its Early Advance—Coast Market Stagnant.

Chicago, Feb. 15.—This market had a spell of the blues today and after wheat opened from 1-8c to 1-4c higher it began to show signs of depression and closed with its head barely above water. Bids at the closing were just about 1-8c a bushel higher than yesterday.

Chicago wheat trade was not of aggressive disposition during today's session and the volume of business was light in comparison with recent weeks.

Even the fact that the visible supply shows a huge decrease from a year ago failed to infuse any great activity into the trading. Today's figures of the American gain visible supply as compared with a year ago show in bushels:

In so far as general conditions were concerned, this should have been a very bullish day in the local wheat trade. The betterment of cash wheat buying at primary centers and the slight advance in the bids as well as the improved foreign situation, were all aids of consequence to support the bull case.

Liverpool opened 1-2d to 5-8d higher and closed with a net advance of 5-8d to 7-8d above yesterday. Paris was 5 to 10 higher for wheat and 10 to 20 for flour. Antwerp closed with a gain of 5 points Berlin 3-4 and Budapest 5-8.

Stagnation Is Continued. Portland, Feb. 15.—So far as the grain trade is concerned there is little of interest in the market at this time. Local conditions are stagnant and the trade is not inclined to even look at what the outside markets are doing. Therefore, to compare the local market with outside prices would be impossible.

All big millers and buyers have stayed away from the market for a longer time recently than ever before. Conditions in the Pacific northwest are peculiar in themselves and therefore, we are out of line with happenings elsewhere.

It is still impossible to state whether receding will be necessary in a large portion of the Pacific northwest wheat acreage and therefore little effort has been made recently either by buyers or sellers to get local wheat out of the territory.

## SALIENT POINTS IN THE TRACTION MOVEMENT

Here's a brief synopsis of the contract with the Washington-Oregon Traction company:

- 1—Pendleton people are asked to invest \$50,000 in stock of the Washington-Oregon Traction company.
- 2—The first payment of \$20,000 or two-fifths of the subscription becomes due after the company has built three miles of road within the city and vicinity and established gasoline-electric car service.
- 3—The second payment of \$20,000 or two-fifths of the subscription becomes due after the company has built six miles of track, established car service upon the same and provided a public park upon which a minimum of \$10,000 is to be spent in improvements.
- 4—The third payment of \$10,000 or the remaining one-fifth, becomes due after the company has electrified its line with electricity from its own power plant. It agrees to do this within two years time.
- 5—The Washington-Oregon Traction company agrees to spend a minimum of \$200,000 within the next two years in this city and vicinity and in developing their power plant.
- 6—The directors of the traction company sign a personal bond insuring that the company will perform every provision of its contract. Unless it does so the directors will return to Pendleton subscribers the amounts of their subscriptions in cash or else give them property of equivalent value.
- 7—The directors signing the bond and contract are Samuel Drumheller, president; A. S. Baumeister, John Smith, Mrs. Alvina A. Baumeister and D. Fitzgerald.
- 8—Pendleton stockholders are to name at least one member of the company's board of directors.

SOME ADDITIONAL POINTS. The traction company is to get no Pendleton money until it has first expended its own money upon its line and in equipping the same.

2—It is estimated the company will spend twice as much money in Pendleton as it will receive from local people. Perhaps much more.

The traction company, according to the statement of Samuel Drumheller, president, has made a contract for 52 miles of steel, the contract being contingent upon the raising of the Pendleton money.

4—The success of the Washington-Oregon company's enterprise means an additional power supply for Pendleton and thus cheaper electricity for lighting and for power purposes.

5—The establishment of a traction system such as the Washington-Oregon company promises, will connect Pendleton with all its tributary territory and so insure the commercial supremacy of this place.

6—Ample and cheap electrical power, such as the Washington-Oregon company promises, will strengthen Pendleton's present manufacturing industries and bring new industries to the city.

## LEGION OF HONOR FOR MRS. W. K. VANDERBILT

Paris.—It is unofficially announced that Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt will be decorated with the Order of Legion of Honor at the next promotion. This has been removed before, but there is every reason to believe that the French government has at last yielded to the almost universal demand on the part of those who are interested in the charitable work of Paris.

Only the minor portion of Mrs. Vanderbilt's time is given up to society and at her own cost she has established one of the most perfect hospitals in Paris, of which Dr. Baulter is the head.

Her interest in hospital work is unflagging and her donations to charity though anonymous are very large. Her decoration will be the only recompense offered for her work for the poor of Paris.
