

ONE LOT OF COWS IS SOLD AT \$4.75

EXTRA GOOD QUALITY BRINGS AN ADVANCE

Fair Run of Cattle—Market for Steers is Only Steady—General Market is Quiet.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Feb. 17.—Market for cows shows an advance over the other lines of the cattle market and at Stockdale today one sale was made at \$4.75 or an advance of about 15c over previous quotations.

There was again a very fair run of cattle in the yards today and following the small run of yesterday and the absence of supplies the day previous the trade took hold and while buyers were not offering over former figures for steers they paid the fractional advance. In one instance, for cows, The lot of cows that went at \$4.75, while very light, averaging 982 pounds, was of extra select quality; a sale of 16 head of good stuff that averaged 1060 pounds being made at 25c under the extreme top.

No Fancy Steers Were Offering. No real fancy steers were offering in Stockdale market today and the best that came did not bring more than \$5.25. Several loads went at this figure; all being classed as good quality by the official censor of the Livestock Exchange.

If there was strength in cows, the other branches of the cattle market showed only steadiness and this was the official report of the Stockyards censor today.

Several lots of bulls that averaged from 1600 to 1800 pounds were sold; the heaviest at \$3.50 and the lightest lot at \$3.10.

There were no arrivals of sheep in the yards again today. Dealers, generally quote that market steady at former prices.

Those Who Supply the Market. A. B. Ford sent in a load of hogs from North Yamhill.

Frazier Butchering company had four loads of cattle, offering from Nampa, Idaho, in the yards today.

Thirman & Harris sent in three loads of cattle from Baker City.

The strike was made two days ago at which time M. J. Francis, an oil expert of California, sent by the St. Johns Company to Vale, to report on the progress of the work, submitted a written statement to the effect that the well sunk by Mr. Hunt will yield from 25 to 250 barrels of oil per day and that this quantity without further development is sufficient to make the property a paying proposition commercially.

It is a condition of Mr. Hunt's contract with the company that he is to receive, in case of a successful flow of oil, in addition to the regular price for the sinking of the well, a bonus of \$1.00 per foot for the depth of the well and in addition 5,000 shares of the Eastern Oregon Oil & Gas company's capital stock. This bonus, which amounts to \$750 and the additional shares of stock have according to the experts report, been earned by Mr. Hunt.

There has been received at Ontario a large shipment of cement which is to be used in the encasing of the pipe in the well and Mr. Hunt's visit to Portland is largely in connection with the placing of this cement and in making other sinkings in the vicinity of the well which is now proven to be a commercial success.

PROJECTILE PENETRATES 23 FEET OF CONCRETE. Washington.—The first test of a reinforced concrete parapet as a means of defense against the attack of high power projectiles has just been concluded at the Sandy Hook proving grounds.

The tests confirmed the mathematical calculations of the penetrative power of the 12 inch guns. A concrete wall 20 feet thick and reinforced with heavy steel beams was pierced by this gun at its high velocity.

It is computed that the projectile will penetrate at its greatest speed a wall 23 feet thick before its power is spent, and experiments at Sandy Hook confirmed this estimate.

The tests will be continued to ascertain the penetrative power of all weapons with which all modern men of war are equipped, including the 13 and 14 inch guns. It is expected to determine by these experiments the extent to which concrete will be used in fortifications.
