

STEERS AGAIN HIT HIGH WATER MARK

FORMER HIGH PRICE OF \$5.75 IS OBTAINED

Extra Good Quality in Stockdale Commands the Limit—Demand for sheep increasing—As high as \$7 offered for Wethers.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Feb. 18.—Taken in a whole, the livestock market is holding its own quite well. The demand for sheep is increasing and higher prices are being offered for strictly A1 quality.

Stockdale commission merchants are quoting as high as \$7 for wethers, but to get this price the stock must be first class and yearlings at that.

Some Steers Sold at \$5.75. Select steers are still selling as high as \$5.75 in the union stockyards here although this price is obtainable only for lots that will top all other quality.

A sale of two heifers, very light but of excellent quality, was made during the same period at \$4.65.

Market for calves is quite firm, with receipts small and prices showing practically no change for recent weeks.

Better Run of Hogs. Better run of hogs was shown in the yards today, a total of 415 head being received. Dealers say that buyers are not offering over \$9.25 for the stuff now coming forward.

Fact that \$9.40 has been received for hogs at Chicago, did not excite the local trade in the least. Hogs that brought the top at Chicago were of excellent quality.

Among the shippers. C. C. Day shipped in two loads of hogs from Lewiston, Idaho.

B. M. Stanfield, after whom the town of Stanfield was named, shipped in a load of sheep from that growing center today.

M. R. Yates, another Stanfield shipper, was in the yards with a load of cattle.

Joe Raymond sent in a car from Becho. Kettle Bros. supplied the market with two loads of cattle and calves from Union and two loads of cattle from North Powder.

George A. Gerwick sent in two loads of hogs from Welser, Idaho. Nesterson & Wiley shipped in a load of cattle from Joseph.
