Some enterprising congressman has Only 50c at Tallman & Co. started a movement by introducing a bill to establish an experimental auto-post rural service, on certain routes to be selected by the postmaster general. One of the conditions is that the routes selected for the experiment shall embrace only well graded and macadamized roads. The auto-coaches are to be equipped for carrying mail, merchandise, baggage and pas-sengers, the capacity to be at least ten passengers and fifteen hundred pounds of baggage. The round trip fare to any point is to be ten cents for adults and five for children. The speed capacity of the auto-coach to be not less than 100 miles a day.

Greater than this, however, has been the loss occasioned by priests and monks, who have advised their parishioners to refrain from bidding at sales, and have then bought in the property themselves at low figures.
