

NEW RECORD MADE FOR FEEDER HOGS

\$8.75 PAID FOR LOT IN YARDS YESTERDAY

Extra Select Stock Brings \$9.50—Sale of Cows at 10c Advance—All Lines Quoted Steady.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Ore., Feb. 23.—A further advance of 5c in the price of hogs in the east, caused local buyers to bid up their quotations and sales are being made in the Stockdale yards as high as \$9.50.

According to the official announcement of the Portland livestock exchange all lines are quoted steady today.

There was only a limited run of stock in the yards during the past 24 hours and therefore buyers are inclined to hold steadier views.

Record prices the being paid here for feed hogs, one sale of 95 head being made during the day at \$8.75; the highest price ever received in any market.

A new high mark was quoted for extra good cows today when a transaction was closed at \$4.75. The lot numbered 25 head and averaged 1071 pounds.

Those Who Ship to Stockdale, Ed Beck had a shipment of one car of hogs from Buhl, Idaho, in the yards today.

R. G. Cannon sent in a load of cattle from Shaniko, Ore.

A year ago today there was a firm tone in all lines of livestock. Hogs were advanced 25c because of the very small supply while other lines were firmer at unchanged values.

THE WHEAT MARKET

WORLD'S WHEAT MARKET BEARISH DURING SESSION

Chicago Opens and Closes Lower After Severe Spell of Blues Abroad—Liverpool is Hit Hard—California Buying Northwest Wheat.

Russian Crop is Normal. Liverpool, Feb. 23.—Broom-corn wheat crop prospects are generally normal.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—Wheat market had a few bullish outbursts, but closed 3-8c to 5-8c a bushel lower than Monday.

Liverpool and other foreign markets were weak and depressed. Liverpool opened 1-4d lower than Monday, or unchanged from yesterday, and closed 7-8d to 1 1-4d lower than Monday, or 1-2d under yesterday.

The fact that foreigners became extremely bearish yesterday while Chicago and other American markets were closed owing to a holiday, added to the bearish flame in this market today.

A special from Kansas City says: The last 24 hours have probably done more to kill the growing wheat in the southwest than any like period before. It is below zero over the entire winter wheat territory.

The pit crowd started to cover their shorts when Bartlett, Potter & Co. bought a little, and ran the market up on themselves.

California Buying Wheat. Portland, Feb. 23.—California is again buying wheat in this territory and a small amount of sales are reported around \$1.05 track for club and \$1.13 for bluestem. Millers are taking on a few small purchases around the same figures, and the general expectation is that the trade will improve.

Oats market is weaker and some interests are again quoting a decline. Hay is firm for good quality, with eastern Oregon timothy very scarce because of the demand at home. It is stated that sales of interior hay are being made there at \$22.50 a ton.

Flour market is quiet at unchanged prices.

"RIGHTS OF MEN" SLOGAN OF NEW BAY COLONY

San Francisco.—"The Rights of Men Colony," a co-operative community of socialistic ideals, is being established today on a 28000-acre ranch near Ukiah by a group of four teen families of San Francisco and

Oakland under the leadership of Albert Adelson, a jeweler of Oakland.

The families left their former homes yesterday and will take up their new residence today and commence the new life.

The colony is to be conducted strictly along co-operative lines, dividing the profits equally. There is to be a central kitchen and dining hall, but each family will have its separate cottage and home life. There will ultimately be accommodations for thirty families.

The ranch has 2800 acres, of which 1100 are under cultivation and the remainder is good grazing and timber land. There are now on the property 120 head of cattle, 24 horses, 60 hogs and a variety of poultry.

Each family has paid in \$100 to start with and the livestock will be purchased immediately. The ranch itself has been leased for fifteen years at a quarterly rental of \$625. The ultimate purchase price, which will have been paid in within the life of the lease, is \$72,000. The land was formerly owned by W. J. Hildreth of Ukiah.

PUBLIC NOTICE

1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 4 of the Reclamation Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat., 388) public notice was given on December 27, 1907, of the furnishing of water from the Umatilla project, Oregon, for lands in T. 4 N., R. 28 E., W. M., with other lands, and setting forth the conditions and charges therefor.

2. In said notice it was provided that homestead entries accompanied by applications for water rights might be made under the provisions of the Reclamation Act for the farm units shown upon the farm unit plats for the above described townships, effective December 23, 1907, by the Secretary of the Interior, and on file in the local land office at LaGrande, Oregon.

3. For certain farm units in Sections 2 and 3 of said township, as hereinafter listed, homestead entries accompanied by applications for water rights for the total irrigable areas thereof, have been filed and accepted in the local land office.

4. During the irrigation seasons of 1908 and 1909 only portions of the irrigable areas within the said farm units could be irrigated from the project system as then constructed, the acreage within such farm units thus capable of irrigation and upon which the first installment of the charges for building, operation and maintenance became due on December 1, 1908, being as follows:

- T. 4 N., R. 28 E., W. M. NW 1/4 Section 3, Farm Unit F. 3 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit D. 1 acre. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit C. 4 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit G. 10 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit H. 6 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit E. 2 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit F. 1 acre. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit G. 2 acres. NW 1/4 Section 2, Farm Unit H. 4 acres.

Notice is hereby given that the farm unit plats have been amended to show the total irrigable acreages of these farm units, that water will be furnished under the provisions of the Reclamation Act in the irrigation season of 1910 for the remaining portions of irrigable lands therein, and that said remaining portions shall be subject to all the terms and conditions of the public notice of December 27, 1907, and public notices and orders amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, except that the first installment of the charges for building, operation and maintenance, for said remaining portions of irrigable lands shall become due December 1, 1910.
