

Copenhagen.-The plan to make the house in which Henrik Ibsen lived at Grimstad, Norway fr m 1844 to 1850, when the great Norwegian writer wrote his first tragedy, Catilina, a national shrine at which the thousands of followers of the great Scandinavian genius in all parts of the world may worship, is being pushed rapidly and will certainly be successful,

Ibsen was born at Skien, but the house in which he first saw the light has been destroyed and the Grimstad apothecarie's house where the poet, as a boy, learned to make liniments, tinetures and pills, is all that remains to recall his youth.
