STEERS HIT \$6.25 AGAIN IN MARKET

NEW HIGH RECORD MADE IN PORTLAND

Prineville Steers, Shipped by E. L. Clayton, Bring a New High Record -Other Lines Also Firm.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, Mar. 8 .-- A new high record was reached in the market for steers today when a sale was made in the yards at \$6.25. This is 15c above the highest price heretofore obtained in whis or any other market on the Pa-

Some fairly good steers sold up to 16 and some not over heavy cows went around \$4.75. These sales indicate a better feeling in the general market fer cattle.

Bulls are selling as high as \$4.50 and are above all previous records in the local market,

Absence of sheep and lambs from the market is causing some concern but the market is extremely firm with as high as \$7.75 offering for fancy lambs while wethers are quoted up to \$6.50.

Little Loss During Winter. Latest reports from the interior in-dicate that the losses to livestock during the winter were not nearly so severe as believed.

"While it cost the sheep men about 70c a head more to keep their sheep this winter than during previous year," says C. C. Clark, the well known livestock buyer of Arlington, "the losses have not been very severe and those who have lost their sheep generally figure that it was cheaper to lose them than to buy sufficient feed. General conditions in the Arsection are good. With a rainfall 75 per cent more than a year ago the ground is in excellent condition, and bumper crop prospects are bright indeed."

FORESTRY STUDENTS TO HELP UNCLE SAM

Seattle, Wash .- It has just been announced by the Portland office that the United States forest service is lanning to use about 35 forest students from the University of Washington in practical forest investigations on national forests in Washington and Oregon during the coming summer. Hitherto, the service has been greatly handicapped by lack of a sufficient number of qualified men in conducting field work of a special nature and it is believed that by the employment of these western young men this summer very much can be

ecomplished toward securing more

reliable data regarding the growth

of important tree species and the yield of different types of forest land. Last summer the services of Professor Frank G. Miller and three students from the University of Washington forest school were utilized in collecting field data in connection with a study of the growth and yield of Douglas fir, the results of which is planned to publish this spring the form of a circular. One student from the Oregon agricultural ollege was also engaged in this work.

This summer, by the employment of a much large number of students, it is planned to obtain data which will the national forests in the two states.
