BAKER CITY GROWING EXTREMELY RIGHTEOUS

Baker City, Ore.—The last movement in the Sunday closing of saloons and a general tightening up of loose ends in Baker City occurred Thursday night, when ordinances were passed by the common council regulating in every detail the retail and wholesale liquor business.

Not only saloons, but cigar stores and poolrooms, come under the ordinances, and the youth under 21 years of age is not only protected from the liquor traffic, but he is also protected from card tables and pool and billiard tables as well.

MOVING PICTURES SENT BY TELEGRAPH

NEW DEVICE TRANSMITS SCENE AS IT HAPPENS

French Inventor Perfects Machine Which Enables Him to Send Moving Pictures Over the Wires—Another Achievement in Electricity.

London.—Something rather more tangible than television has been devised by a French inventor, Edouard Belin, who is making an apparatus by which a series of photographs can be telegraphed one after the other instantaneously and reformed so as to give a cinematograph reproduction of any event at any distance.

Thus if a series of pictures were taken of some event at a city such as Newcastle they could be rapidly prepared for the telegraph, and a facsimile reproduction of the event sent immediately on a screen in London.

M. Belin uses a paper photograph of quite an original type as the sending "record." An ordinary halftone newspaper illustration, if examined closely, is seen to consist of innumerable dots of various sizes which combine to form the picture with its light and shade; M. Belin's paper records consist of innumerable perforations in a sheet of paper, each hole of a certain size and corresponding to the dots of a halftone photograph.

This is laid on a metal base and drawn along under a set of metal brushes; the wider the holes the more contact there is between the brush and the metal underneath. By this means the amount of electric current sent to the distant viewing screen is varied.

Gives Life and Motion. The currents of various strengths are made to illuminate more or less strongly small portions of the viewing screen, each of which corresponds to a perforation in the picture transmitted. By passing a series of cinematograph photographs under the brushes at the transmitting station a reproduction would be seen with all the original life and motion in it.

The practicability of the idea has already been tested between a suburb of Paris and a station in Paris itself, but M. Belin has not yet constructed a receiver capable of more than demonstrating that the idea is not a vain one.

He claims that television with selenium is not practicable, "owing to the slowness with which the selenium "cell" responds to changes of light, while his own apparatus is purely mechanical precision, should solve the problem of transmitting "living" images over the wires.

SNUB FOR ENVOY'S WIFE.

Curious Incident Marks Recent Vienna Court Function. Vienna.—A curious incident which occurred at the recent court ball has excited much attention in diplomatic circles.

As wife of the dean of the diplomatic corps, at present Herr von Tschirachky was considered entitled to the escort of Count Aehrenthal, the foreign minister, in the procession to the ballroom immediately behind the imperial and royal personages. Count Aehrenthal, however, requested the papal nuncio to escort Mme. Tschirachky, and he himself escorted Lady Cartwright, wife of the British ambassador. There is a disposition in certain quarters to magnify the incident, and to suggest that it is not unlikely to have important political consequences.

The court officials, however, deny that Mme. Tschirachky has any special privileges, and assert that Count Aehrenthal has a right to escort any woman.

CHAMBERLAIN WOULD ALLOT INDIAN LANDS

Washington.—Senator Chamberlain is preparing to introduce a bill providing for final disposition of all lands in Indian reservations in Oregon. He has gathered information that only 3689 Indians remain on all Oregon reservations, many of whom have had their allotments, and that 1,274,114 acres remain unallotted on three reservations, as follows: Warm Springs, 322,108; Umatilla, 79,820; Klamath, 872,186. The bill is designed as much for the good of Indians as for whites, by giving such Indians the benefits of education, development and self dependence, at the same time releasing to production large areas now closed.

Senator Bourne has introduced a bill to compel vessels carrying 50 or more passengers plying on the ocean from United States ports to carry wireless telegraph equipment, in penalty of \$1000 fine for violation.

The bill to establish a land office at Vale, Ore., passed the house yesterday. It had already passed the senate.
