

PRICES ARE INTACT AT HIGH QUOTING

ALL LINES OF STOCK HAVE FIRM FEELING

Hogs Still Sell at \$10.50—But Few Steers Received—Quoted at \$6.25—Sheep Go to Sound Packers.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 9.—All lines of livestock were quoted firm today and hogs again sold at \$10.50. Carsten of Tacoma bought two loads in the market today at the high figure.

The same interests had in 13 loads of cattle and four doubles of sheep in from Idaho this morning. The stock was to be fed and rested in the yards and then shipped to the Tacoma plant.

Only a few head of steers were received today and these were light and therefore did not bring the highest quotation. Market for steers is firm and real good quality is expected to hold around \$6.25; the price quoted yesterday.

Outside of the sheep billed through to the sound packers, there were no arrivals in the yards today and therefore none were offering in the open market.

Among the Shippers, J. C. Reynolds was an arrival from Condon with a load of cattle.

S. B. Ball shipped in two carloads of cattle from Ontario, Or.

J. N. McFadden brought in 66 head of hogs from Junction City.

S. L. Folsom came from Albany with a load of cattle, calves and horses mixed.

THE WHEAT MARKET

DAMAGE NEWS BRINGS SHARP RISE IN WHEAT

New Crop Options Close Two and an Eighth and Three Quarter Cents Higher Than Yesterday.

Winter Wheat Damaged.

Chicago, March 9.—Reports to the local grain trade indicate that severe damage has been done to the winter wheat crop in the southwest. This caused a sharp advance in new crop options here today.

Chicago, March 9.—Traders were scared at the opening, but not recovered their nerve during the day, but pushed the price of wheat 1 1/4 to 2 3/4 c a bushel higher than yesterday at today's closing.

There was little doing in the wheat trade abroad during the day. Liverpool was unchanged from yesterday at today's opening and closed unchanged to 1-4 lower.

Damage reports from the southwest brought out very heavy buying in the new crop deliveries and caused the sharp advance in both July and September.

MAN IS VAMPIRE, SAYS MISS KUHN BEVERIDGE

Berlin.—Miss Kuhn Beveridge, who is shortly to open an exhibition in Leipzig of her sculptures, the chief piece of which is entitled the "Vampire," was interviewed today on this conception.

"It is a mistake to suppose that vampires are bats or mythical things," said Miss Beveridge.

SPOTLESS LINEN OF LONDON POLICE MAY BE SOILED

London.—It is commonly reported that startling revelations may be expected of corruption in London's esteemed metropolitan police, unless the authorities can hush the matter up. This unexpected news of bribery and disquiet in a force hitherto considered above suspicion, and a model of discipline and efficiency for the police of all other cities, has caused a

sensation. The scandal has grown out of the custom of permitting the "bobbies" to receive tips for services to citizens. The wage of a London patrolman is small. He is regarded by householders as a sort of servant and treated as such, and London servants are well treated. The police being needed to preserve order outside the church at a recent fashionable wedding a sum of money was handed to a higher official to distribute among the men. An inspector, who has lately been disciplined, charges that the money was misappropriated, and the men of various police stations have so far shown their sympathy with him as to refuse to go on duty.

The inspector has carried his case to the home office. In itself the matter seems trivial, insufficient to arouse so much indignation. There seems to be a strong suspicion of more general corruption in the management of the force. The present commissioner, Sir Henry, is a man of high character, who served as assistant to Colonel Bradford, and has a distinguished record.

HANDIT IS SCION OF ARISTOCRATIC FAMILY

San Jose.—More than six persons have identified the bandit captured in Stanislaus county under the name of Charles P. Tevis as Chris, Myrtle, wayward son of one of the oldest and most aristocratic families in the state.

Tevis, who is charged with having shot to death one of his own band of desperadoes to prevent him from falling into the hands of the authorities after being wounded, had been identified as Myrtle by Mayor Peter Martin of Alviso, John Martin, the mayor's brother, and other persons who claim to have known the Myrtles since childhood.

Young Myrtle left home about sixteen years ago and has not been seen by any of his immediate relatives since. Mrs. John Graves, wife of the big distiller, is a cousin of Myrtle and Mrs. Hughes, a sister, is the owner of the Alviso hotel.

Since his arrest the bandit refused to discuss his affairs in any way, and has not admitted to the authorities any of the facts revealed by a member of his band that made a confession immediately following his capture.

WINSTON CHURCHILL IS A LITTLE OF ENGLAND

London.—Mr. Winston Churchill has been named the Nelson W. Aldrich of British parliament. On the very day that Mr. Aldrich made his famous plan to the senate to run the American government upon business methods, Winston Churchill made his first businesslike speech of the new parliamentary session. After all there is a great deal of good old Yankee forethought and system in Churchill's makeup, for his mother is an American and one of the most brilliant women in England today, whether viewed from the social, political, artistic or literary standpoint.

Mr. Churchill was not able in his speech a few days ago to say anything very definite with regard to his party's plans, but he at least stated briefly and frankly what the situation is. He admitted that the cab-

inet would have preferred to resign; he pleaded that it be permitted to remain in office till the supplies were voted and promised that a measure for the settlement of the differences between the lords and commons would be submitted as soon as possible. He called attention to the folly of threatening the lords when such charges were impending. In arguing thus publicly from an understanding between the parties, which is generally believed to exist and is attested by the weak and colorless utterances of the conservative leaders, Mr. Churchill demonstrated that he, at any rate, is ready to set to work.
