NEW COAST RECORD FOR SALE OF COWS

ONE LOT BRINGS \$5.50 IN PORTLAND MARKET

Fancy Cattle Bring Premium—Steers From South Sell Up to \$6.25—Calves Advance to \$7.00 Today.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 10.—Cows sold today at the highest price on record on the Pacific coast for anything except show stock when a sale was made at \$5.50 or fully 50c above the extreme value heretofore reached. While only two head were moved at this figure the sales indicated the full strength of the present situation in the local cattle market.

While the receipts of cattle during the past 24 hours were among the greatest ever shown in this market for a like period, a large per cent of the shipments during the day were for outside markets and therefore merely passed through the yards.

While cows have sold high at \$5.50 still several sales of bulls were made during the day at \$4.

There were some good steers in from California and two of the cars brought \$6.25, the recent high record. Several loads of light stuff from the same destination sold during the day at \$5.90. These were fed by J. C. Dodson in Shasta county, Cal.

HEAVY DAMAGE TO KANSAS WHEAT CROP

UNFAVORABLE WEATHER CAUSES MUCH LOSS

Grain Dealers' Report Shows Severe Losses But Chicago Market Falls to Show Much Appreciation.

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It Happened in Kansas.

Chicago, March 10.—Kansas Grain Dealers' association finds that wheat in that state north of the Union Pacific Railroad line, has been damaged 60 per cent; south of the line 30 per cent, and the rest of the state 10 per cent by recent unfavorable weather.

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Chicago, March 10.—The wheat market opened firm for the May and week for other options. Closing was 1-81-2c a bushel lower than yesterday, with July weakest.

There was a somewhat firmer feeling abroad in wheat market trading. At Liverpool there was an opening advance of 1-4@3-8 d. while the closing was 1-8@3-8d above yesterday.

Wheat closed with a small net loss for the day, after rather sharp action in prices, both early and late, and considerable contest between the bulls and bears for control of the market. There was no volume of outside orders to follow up this advance, and this caused the holders in the local trade to take the selling side and secure profits. It took but little aggressive support in the last half hour to give the market to recovery from the low point, and the market closed with a good tone.

The Grain Dealers' association in Kansas finds 50 to 60 per cent damage in 10 counties north of the Union Pacific railroad; 30 per cent damage in counties further south, and the balance of the state showing injury of about 10 per cent.

Helped by strength in wheat at the opening, corn prices had a little advance, but there was an early return of heaviness and a decline. Cash market ruled steady.

May oats became decidedly weak at one time today, and had a break to 42 3-4c at the close. Shipping sales over 200,000.

It was an uneventful session with prices at the close steady for land, 5c lower for ribs and 10c lower for pork compared with Wednesday's final quotations. Hogs at all western packing points were nearly 40,000, short of the same day last year.
