PORTLAND PAYS \$11 FOR BIG PORKERS

SHANIKO SHIPPER CARRIES OFF HONORS

Highest Price in Country Obtained for 82 Hogs—Only One Carload of Stuff Arrives in Market Today.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 11—Friday was a very lucky day for U. S. Grewell and for Shaniko for it gives Mr. Grewell \$11 per hundred pounds for hogs and puts Shaniko on the map as receiving the highest price for swine in the country.

Total arrivals of livestock in the Portland yards during the past 24 hours were but one carload of hogs, 97 head. These came from Shaniko. Out of the lot \$2 sold at \$11 per hundred pounds and 15 head went at \$9.50. The latter were simply feeders and therefore Shaniko not only broke all American prices for finished hogs but likewise secured way above anything heretofore secured for fed swine.

All Lines Are Very Firm. All lines of livestock are very firm in the Portland yards and the scant supplies indicate that not only will present values be continued for some time but there is a probability of still higher values. However, until actual sales are made none can say what the market here will reach.

Sale of cows at \$5.50, reported yesterday, indicated an advance even above \$6.25 for steers for cows generally sell at a reduction of \$1 from the price of the former. However, quality counts.

SAYS U. S. YACHTS ARE SUPERIOR TO GERMAN

Kiel, Prussia.—Admiral Brandon, who attended the German and American yacht contest at Marblehead last September, contributed an interesting account of it for the new volume of the year book of the Imperial Yacht club of Kiel, which built some of the best German yachts, and is thus in position to speak with authority on the comparative merits of these crafts.

In regard to the handling of the contesting boats, the Admiral thinks that the Americans were not superior to the Germans and in the case of the Havella, he thinks they were decidedly outclassed. The German boats were superior to the American only when their sails are carried completely erect, that is, when sailing before a light wind, but as soon as the American yachts heeled over before the wind they showed themselves considerably faster than the Germans. The admiral thus sums up his judgment:

"It seems to me, therefore, that the American boats, except in really bad weather, are considerably better than the German ones"

SUN TEMPLE DISCOVERED.

Prof. Garstang Makes Find on Site of Ancient Merot.

Cairo.—Professor Garstang has discovered on the site of the ancient Merot, the later capital of the Ethiopian monarchs, a sun temple by Ergamenes, mentioned by Diodorus. The temple is a unique structure showing Greek inspiration, and containing sculptures representing King Ergamenes' victories and a triumphal procession. The building includes a sanctuary lined with brilliantly enameled tiles.

The discovery shows that the invention of the Merotic script was due to Ergamenes, the alphabet being modeled on the Greek. It also establishes the values of the Merotic letters.

Further excavations which have been carried out on the site of the Temple of Ammon at Merot prove that the building was grander than had been anticipated, and was restored by Neteg Ammon. Many inscriptions and statues have been found.

THE WHEAT MARKET

BUY WHEAT ON REPORT OF LOSS TO GROWING CROP

Initial Advance in Chicago Is Lost for July and September but May Closes With Rise of Quarter Cent.

Chicago, March 11.—Wheat started firm but closed generally weak for new crop and firm for present crop deliveries. Closing values were 1-4c higher for May, 3-5c lower for July and 1-4c a bushel lower for the September.

There was considerable buying early on the report of damage to the growing crop and all options were helped thereby. While May was firmest all day, there was more activity in the July and September.

Foreign markets were generally higher. At Liverpool the opening was 3-8d higher and the closing 5-8d to 1-1-8d above yesterday.

Berlin wheat closed with an advance of 1c above yesterday. Broomhall estimates the world's shipments of wheat and flour Monday, exclusive of North America, at 10,900,000 bushels. He likewise predicts a moderate increase on passage to the United Kingdom.

Indian shipments of wheat are 336,000 bushels. Australian shipments, 1,008,000 bushels; Argentina, wheat, 4,984,000 bushels, corn, 41,000 bushels.

Grain Market Lower.

Portland.—While lower prices are named in the local wheat market, practically no business is reported for any account. Large millers say they have all the wheat they want and small millers are not buying because flour is too hard to sell. Best quotation available today is \$1.05@1.03 track for club and \$1.10 for blastem.

According to leading milling interests there is no business at all offering in the oriental flour market except at a sharp reduction in prices, which the millers cannot afford to accept at the present price of wheat. "We are holding on and shipping a few lots to the orient and hope to bring the buyers to our way of thinking," explained one interest today.

TOOK IN THE SCIENTISTS.

Swiss Imposter Fools Geneva Geographical Society Successfully. Geneva.—At the meeting of the Geographical Society at Berne recently, a well-dressed young man with an Arabic name presented himself to the committee, stating that he held a high position in Abyssinia, and was

a friend of the Emperor Menelik. He was warmly received, and was present at the receptions, banquets and meetings of the society, spoke eloquently, and at great length on Abyssinia and its people, the customs costumes and morals of Ethiopia to the venerable professors and the public, on whom he made an excellent impression. For three days the young man was feted, and could not attend to all the social invitations.

It has now been discovered that the "Abyssinian" was a Swiss with a large imagination, who had carefully studied Abyssinia in books, and who had the audacity on an impostor.
