MICHIGAN CAPTAIN LOST TO HIMSELF

JOY MILLER IS AT WALLA WALLA, HIS MEMORY GONE

Famous Little Quarterback of Yost Eleven Working on Fruit Ranch--Remembers Nothing of Past Life--Can't Recall Home, Alma Mater or Sweetheart.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Unable to remember even his father and claiming that he has never been in Michigan, James Joy Miller, quarterback and captain-elect of the University of Michigan football team, is working on the Blacklock fruit farm, three miles from this city. He was found through the efforts of the inspection end of postoffice department and Postmaster Brunton.

Miller remembers nothing of what happened up to a few weeks ago. Through bright and quick to learn his work at the fruit farm, he has no previous knowledge of his life. He declares that he never saw a football game, much less played in one; that he has no knowledge of his parents or of his home, knows nothing of college and until he was shown on the

He does not even know what his name is, but took the name Joy Miller because that was the one in his watch. The watch also contains a photograph of his sweetheart, but he did not know who she was.

Miller left his home in January, after having been dismissed from college and his position on the football team for non-registration. Miller's hair is gray. He first had work sorting potatoes on the ranch and is now running a transit. He is well liked on the farm. His father is arranging to come west and get him to see if some operation will not restore his memory.

Insinger, chairman of the board of governors of the 18th National Irrigation congress; David Brown, originator of the National apple show and head of the Hazlewood company, a \$2,000,000 concern operating dairy plants in Washington, Oregon and Idaho; D. W. Twohy, president of the Old National bank; Frederick W. Dewart, counsel, and F. H. Mason, millionaire merchant, who is now in Europe studying good roads and methods of building to get the best results.
