# FIRST OF SPRING LAMBS IN MARKET

## INITIAL SHIPMENT ARRIVES IN STOCKDALE

California Sends Offering to Yards—Hogs Decline 15c—Receipts of Swine Are Better—Top Steers Firm at \$6.50.

Portland, Oregon, March 18.—First spring lambs of the season will be offered in the stockyards tomorrow, providing trains are on time. A shipment is due this evening from California. It will consist of both sheep and lambs. The lambs are said to be in excellent condition.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 18.—As predicted in this report yesterday there was a decline of 15 cents in the price of hogs during the past 24 hours. The one car which arrived yesterday was not sold until 4 o'clock in the afternoon at \$11.10, as forecast. The lot consisted of 78 head that averaged 211 pounds.

This morning there was a further bearing down on prices by buyers and 201 head that averaged 134 pounds went at the same figure as yesterday's sole transaction.

Receipts of livestock are somewhat better, especially in the hog department. There are indications that this line will show a continued increase. Indications therefore are for a lower price range, following a similar movement that recently set in at eastern and middle west centers.

Top steers were firm at \$6.50 in the yards this morning and sales were made by receivers up to that price. Some light stuff sold around \$6.25, which is considered excellent for that grade.

Only 51 head of sheep were received in the yards today but additional supplies are expected tomorrow.

### Among the Shippers.

Thirman & Harris were offering three loads of cattle from Dillon, Mont.

A. J. Smith shipped in a car of hogs from Pocatello.

Carroll & Shafer had two loads of hogs in the yards. Sent from Colfax, Wash.

C. F. Walker was an arrival with five loads of cattle from Joseph and eight loads of cattle and calves from Ontario, Ore.

N. E. Gale drove in 51 sheep.

M. B. Ferguson shipped a mixed car of livestock from McMinnville, Ore.

# THE WHEAT MARKET

## SEPTEMBER WHEAT SECURES BULK OF TRADING IN PIT

Closes and Opens With Advance But May and July Lose During the Day; Damage Reports Are Mixed.

Chicago, March 18.—September options sprung into prominence today by showing the greatest advance at the opening and the only one at the close of the session of the wheat pit.

The market for wheat opened 1-8c lower for the May, 1-4c higher for the July and 3-8c for September. Closing was 1-2c lower for May, 1-4c for July and 1-8c higher for September.

Market abroad was generally firmer, but some hesitation was shown among traders toward the close. At Liverpool there was an opening advance of 1-2d and the closing was unchanged to 3-8d higher than yesterday.

Crop reports continue to dominate the trade, but because of the uncertainty of the news the trade seems to have centered on so far away an option as September for its operations.

Broomhall estimates world's shipments of wheat for Monday exclusive of North America, at 6,800,000 bushels. He likewise predicts a moderate change on passage.

# THE LION AND THE MOUSE MONDAY NIGHT

The announcement for next Monday at the Oregon theater is Charles Klein's concise and highly convincing story of "The Lion and the Mouse," the American comedy drama which pictures in a very forceful manner incidents in the financial and political situations of the times as Mr. Klein claims to have found them and which hundreds of thousands of playgoers will attest, have not been exaggerated in being condensed into a play. With an original theme for the basis of his play and being the first among the dramatists to undertake the development of such an idea, Mr. Klein met with a success such as comes to the playwright seldom, if ever, in his lifetime. At a period when the press was teeming with exposures of various kinds of "graft," the author quietly selected one of the moving spirits of the "system" and made him the central figure in the story that simply but effectively illustrates the monopolistic tendencies of a certain set of men.

The character of John Burkett Ryder, known in the play as "Ready Money" Ryder, meets with popular conception of what our "captains" of industry are like. Ryder has no time for anything but adding to his millions, and never permits himself to alter this program unless it is necessary to call a temporary halt while he directs the financial annihilation of some one who opposes him.

Shirley Rosmore, whom Mr. Klein has pitted against the "money power," is a splendidly drawn type of a well bred American girl, who, on learning of the disgrace that has been put upon her father, decides to take up the fight and clear his good name.

Ryder's son, Jefferson, of whom the father is very fond, proves himself to be the possessor of a will of his own and here again Mr. Klein has been close to the line, for there are scores of rich men's sons who do not share the parental views in business matters.

Other types whom we find in the play are an unscrupulous politician, Senator Roberts, who is careful to do the bidding of those who placed him in his position.

All the way through, the people whom Mr. Klein found it necessary to introduce are not a bit different from those we have met with or at least gained a knowledge of by reading the daily newspapers and magazines and to this is ascribed in a large measure the success of the play. Its plot is simple, so very much so, that no mental concentration is necessary to follow it.

The company which Henry B. Harris sends here is the principal organization engaged in presenting the play. With a few exceptions, the characters are all portrayed by those who created them, and where changes have been made the present incumbents are said to be quite the equal, and in many instances the superior of their predecessors.

# ITEMS FROM HEPNER

## FARMERS ARE BUSY SOWING SPRING GRAIN

Ranchers Avail Themselves of High Water in Creeks to Build Additional Irrigation Ditches—Young Sheepman Goes Violently Insane—Other News.

(Special Correspondence.)

Hepner, Ore., March 16.—The fine weather is continuing, and the farmers who failed to get their seeding done last fall are rustling to get the grain in. Others are busy with spring seeding and harrowing and getting the soil in condition for the spring rains.

The farmers living along the creeks are taking timely advantage of the high water now in the creeks and are busy repairing and building additional irrigating ditches. Alfalfa fields along the creeks are flooded with water. On account of the unusual amount of moisture this winter the soil is in excellent condition, and the farmers anticipate a fine crop of grain this season.

William Anderson, a sheepman came up from Arlington, the latter part of last week for medical treatment. On Monday evening he became violently insane, and it became necessary to lock him in the county jail. He was examined yesterday by the county officials, pronounced insane and committed to the asylum. Two attendants from that institution are expected to arrive tonight and the unfortunate young man will be taken to Salem in the morning. Mr. Anderson is a young man of twenty-four years. Last fall he bought a band of sheep which he wintered on Willow creek. Medical authorities state that worry over the hard winter and scarcity of feed was probably the cause of the derangement. It is hoped by his many friends that he will recover from this affliction.

Newt Wheelstone, the Morrow county sheep man, has returned from California where he spent the past winter. Mr. Wheelstone brought with him an auto, so constructed that he can use it for carrying supplies to the big stock ranch he purchased last year in Grant county.

Sheriff Shutt and Postmaster Smead returned the first of the week from Portland, where they were called as witnesses in the Wherry trial. John Hayes, now residing in Portland, came up this week to remain on his Butter creek ranch during the lambing and shearing seasons.
