

RANCHERS URGED TO SEE FARMERS' TRAIN

WILL BE OF EDUCATIONAL VALUE TO EVERYONE

Chas. Hill, Organizer for Farmers' Educational Co-Operative Union Urge Attendance of all Country People—Seeds to be Distributed Gratis.

"Every farmer in Umatilla county and especially every member of the farmers' union, should make it a point to be in Pendleton or some other one of the towns in the county on the occasion of the visit of the Farmers' Demonstration train next week," said Charles Hill, secretary of the county and state organizer for the national union, this morning. "The aims of this train are exactly in accord with the purposes and aims of the Farmers' Educational and Co-Operative Union and every farmer should take advantage of this rare opportunity. I expect to accompany the train on its tour through a part of eastern Oregon and will get all the good out of it that I possibly can."

The train will be at Milton and Freeewater, Friday from 8:45 a. m. to 10:45 a. m.; at Athena from 12:30 to 2 p. m.; Adams 2:10 to 3:30 p. m.; Pendleton 4 p. m. to 5:30 p. m., and will also remain over night. Saturday the train will be at Pilot Rock 8:30 a. m. to 10:30 a. m.; Echo, 12:30 to 2:15 p. m.; Stanfield, 2:25 p. m. to 3:50 p. m., and Hermiston, 4:10 p. m. to 5:30 p. m.

Electric Lighted Train.
Electric lighting of the entire train is now planned by the officers of the road. This feature will be added not only to give better light on the exhibits in the baggage-cars, but as a demonstration of what can be accomplished with small gasoline engines in running farm machinery and furnishing lights cheaply for houses, barns and other buildings.

Free distribution of seeds is also planned. Arrangements for the supply having been made yesterday, and as still another feature of the train it is announced that the dairy exhibit will be equipped with a milking machine, the operation of which will be shown in the milking of the two dairy cows that will be carried on the train.

Space Not to Be Sold.
The O. R. & N. officers, since the announcement concerning the train was made, have been besieged by implement and machinery dealers who are willing to pay high prices for exhibit space on the train. The company, however, has decided to eliminate all space advertising, and particular makes of machines or implements will not be recommended. Most of the farm machinery utilized will be supplied by the Oregon Agricultural College and although the machinery will carry the names of the makers, this is unavoidable. All offers for advertising space have been refused.

Distribution of seed will be made among specially selected farmers. It would be impossible for the train to carry seed for distribution to every farmer who will attend the demonstration, and the desire is to place it in the hands of men who it is known will make an effort to utilize the seed in the manner recommended by the Agricultural College experts accompanying the train. With this end in view the commercial and farmers' organizations in the communities to be visited are to be asked to recommend men who will give the seeds the best test possible.

Seed Tests Desired.
The seeds distributed will include Canadian field peas, Minnesota corn and Montana alfalfa. The corn will be distributed at each station along the route. The peas will be given out in the grain growing districts where peas are commended for rotation with wheat as forage crops and for returning vital elements to the soil. The alfalfa seed will be distributed where the soil and climate are deemed adaptable, but will not be given out where the alfalfa is now grown successfully. A dry-farmed alfalfa is recommended strongly in some districts where no attempt is now made to grow it and the effort will be to introduce an acclimated seed into such localities. The other seeds have been selected with the idea of securing what will grow successfully in the communities to be visited.

In Tualatin valley east of the big hill, says the Portland Journal.

Plans for this project have so far progressed that the promoters have procured options on practically two-thirds of the Tualatin valley contiguous to the eastern foot of Council Crest, and in part along the eastern slope of the hill. The route for the tunnel has also been determined upon, and permission gained to construct the bore according to this route.

It is intended to make this tunnel of sufficient size to permit an automobile or carriage driveway on either side of the car track, which is to be laid in the middle. The tunnel will be a little over a mile in length, and will give a means of maintaining a 7-minute car service between the downtown district of the city and the heart of the Tualatin valley, thus opening that district as one of the most desirable and beautiful residence sections of the city.

The plans of the capitalists back of the project are now in course of organization, and it is expected that the first steps toward actual construction will begin before the summer is over.

WILL EXPOSE SCANDAL OF KING LEOPOLD'S LIFE

Brussels.—Charges that King Leopold robbed the state of many millions and that the money had been partly dissipated by the reckless extravagances of the Baroness Vaughn—whose deathbed marriage to the late king has been recognized by the church and her two sons ennobled—were made during a stormy session of the chamber of deputies recently.

In an effort to recover to the state misappropriated funds and its legal share in the estate of Leopold interpellations were made in the chamber respecting the late king's legacies and almost immediately provoked a heated discussion which was still in progress at the time of adjournment. Admissions by the minister of the colonies, M. Renkin, that he had been deceived by Leopold in the financial affairs of the Congo may result in an undeniable demand for his resignation.

M. Vanderveelde, the socialist leader, charged that King Leopold had deceived his ministers and had bequeathed his immense ill-gotten fortune through the creation of illegal companies composed of "straw" men. The greater part of this fortune, he said, was profit from the late king's malodorous administration of the Congo and funds of the crown domain, whose assets should revert to Belgium with annexation.

M. Jansen, a liberal, asserted that many millions had disappeared from the Congo treasury, and amid a scene of excitement demanded to know what money had maintained the extravagance of the Baroness Vaughn's establishment at Balincourt.

The minister of the colonies rose to make answer, and under the fire of questions admitted that he had been deceived in certain respects on the Congo fund. This admission brought cries of "Resign!" "Resign!" from members of the chamber and to relieve the embarrassment was allowed to go over.

To War on House Fly.
Washington.—Preparations were commenced this week by Uncle Sam's chief entomologist and his staff to wage a concerted national warfare on the common housefly, several billions of which are expected to arrive shortly and take up their residence in the homes of the land. Dr. Howard, who is the big bug of the entomological department, is confident that such a crusade will be invaluable in preserving the temper of bald-headed men and conserving the health of the people at large.

Dr. Howard says the campaign will be opened in the country districts, and the department will issue a farmers' bulletin giving advice as to the ill the flies are responsible for and how to eradicate them.

CHURCH DEDICATION DRAWS BIG CROWD

OPENING OF NEW HOUSE OF WORSHIP SUCCESSFUL

New Stone Structure of Christian Church Formally Dedicated—Rev. Scoville in the Pulpit—\$12,000 Was Raised by Subscription—Praise Service in Afternoon.

The dedication of the new Christian church yesterday was a decided success in every way. The building was crowded with people who began to arrive as early as 9 o'clock. The Sunday school session was largely attended, and at the close of the session an invitation was given and twenty people came forward to confess their belief in Jesus the Son of God.

The dedicatory sermon was delivered by Charles Reign Scoville of Chicago. He held the audience in his power for about an hour, then made the call for funds to meet the amount required to finish the building. The people responded very liberally and cheerfully and within a short time ten thousand dollars was subscribed.

Praise Service.
A praise service was held in the afternoon, in which all the local protestant churches joined. There were short speeches of congratulation from Dr. Bleakney of the Presbyterian church, Dr. Evans of the M. E. church, Rev. Storie of the Baptist church, Rev. Meldrum, former pastor, and Rev. Callison of Hellix. The afternoon meeting closed with a union communion service.

In the evening the building was again crowded and every seat was taken. Another effort was made to secure funds, and two thousand dollars more was secured.

The sermon was an able one, in which Dr. Scoville said in part: "When John the Baptist came and said, 'I am going to make the crooked paths straight,' he went on to do it. Not to bring down hills like these, but hills of iniquity."

The doctor then went on to speak of the common sins of the people and in referring to the saloons and the young men who frequent them, said: "The young girl who hangs on to a jug handle and later calls that thing her husband, the wife who has a jug handle for a husband and the mother who encourages her daughter to marry such things are very unfortunate. The young girls should not be shoved off and encouraged to marry such things."

"The boy should be as pure as the girl. You cannot buy virtue and character. I expect to live long enough to see every state in the union dry, and the beautiful stars and stripes will float over the United States without floating over the saloon."

Speaking of gambling, card parties, etc., he said: "You never can save the boys until the women of this country stop gambling for cream pitchers, etc. They all play the same games, use the same cards and at the same hours. The only difference is that the boy plays it in the back room of a saloon and his mother plays it in the fashionable home at card parties."

At the close of this sermon another invitation was given and seven made the start for Jesus.

NAKED EYE MAY SEE COMET ON APRIL 8

San Jose, Cal.—Halley's comet will be visible to the naked eye, just before dawn on April 8, or shortly after that date, states W. W. Sampbell, director of Lick Observatory, on Mount Hamilton.

"While it is never possible to predict how bright a comet is going to be," he said recently, "it is safe to say that the head and perhaps a little of the tail of the comet will be visible at this time."

"On May 18 the comet will pass between the earth and the sun at a distance of 14,000,000 miles from the earth. On this day the earth may pass through the tail of the comet, but there is no danger from terrestrial life as at this distance from the head the tail of the comet will be extremely attenuated. The passage of the comet between the sun and earth cannot be observed to advantage from California, because the sun will be close to the horizon, and observations will have to be made through a great extent of terrestrial atmosphere. Observers in the Hawaiian Islands, Australia and Asia will be well situated. The American Astronomical association will send a photographic expedition to the island of Oahu."
