SPEAKER CANNON VOICES HIS IRE

BITTERLY SCORES WHAT HE CALLS "HYBRID MAJORITY"

"Uncle Joe" at Dinner of Illinois Republican Club Gives Vent to the Wail of the Defeated—Says Republican Party Has No Majority.

Washington.—With his eyes glowing defiance and voice thundering at his enemies with all the day's pent up bitterness, Speaker Cannon made a vitriolic attack on the "hybrid house majority" at the annual dinner of the Illinois Republican association Saturday night.

His face was worn from the force of the terrific assault made upon him but his voice lacked none of its old jauntness and resonance. He was "Uncle Joe" in fighting trim.

A startling statement made by the power shorn, but defiant speaker, was that the republicans no longer have a majority in the senate.

"My God," he cried, with great solemnity, "suppose this 150 pounds of common clay should drop dead tonight, what would the newspapers and magazines, which make a profession of lying and slandering do then? My daughters, grand children, my son in law, would be sorry. But the balance of the world would not have time to be sorry. There never was a truer word said than 'Let the dead bury their dead.' If that were not true, then the world would be one vast house of mourning.

God Alone a Majority. "I know people who think they monopolize the wires of the earth up to the great white throne. They don't give the majority of us a chance. They have cure-alls, they think God and one constitute a majority, forgetting that God alone is a majority and can do without their help.

"It is uncomfortable sometimes to live in a government by the people. There will always be some who are feeble minded, abnormal, insane, or to use a shorter and more common word, are cranks. But we've got to have them.

"There was a new majority made today. It consisted of the democrats and a 15 per cent slough from the republican party. They destroyed the committee on rules. Then what did they do? A resolution was presented declaring the office of speaker vacant. Then what did these men who have been denouncing my personality, these simon-pure followers of Senator La Follette do then? Only eight of them had the courage of their convictions. The result was that while I was elected by a majority of 26 last March they refused to turn me out by a majority of 36.

"That was the way this republican slough started out in its new alliance. And the Sunday papers will be out in the morning with stories about the end of Cannonism and czarism, and perhaps a few of them will say what I said about the house being simply government by majority.

Says People Believe Magazines. "This combination abolished the committee on rules, which has after all the power simply to report to the house, although some seem to think it is like the Biblical example of 'let there be light and there was light.' You in Washington know differently. But the people in the country apparently believe the uplift magazines and the cowardly members of congress who wrought such havoc today. I am thankful I belong to the party of Lincoln and Grant, and Garfield and Roosevelt and Taft, and whenever any charge is made upon it, whether from the pulpit or from the magazine or chautauqua circle I will defend it. I would rather keep the republican faith and fall than to march with men who would disrupt the republican party and succeed.

"The country believes we have a majority of 44 in the house, whereas we have none, nor have we a majority in the senate. But this news is not given to the country by certain publicists. They suppress it and distort it and talk only about Cannonism and the defeat and rebuke of the czar today.

"Some of us pray for the millennium. But I don't want it to come at any time unless the Almighty reaches down his finger and changes the human animal."

SALEM WATER CONCERN BLAMED FOR EPIDEMIC

Salem, Ore.—Alleging that Della S. Dorance, a resident of this city, contracted typhoid fever through drinking the water furnished by the Salem Water company, and that the disease so contracted caused her death on November 15, 1909, Attorney Frank Holmes, on behalf of the administrator, has filed suit against the water company for \$7500.

The case is unique in Oregon jurisprudence. In the complaint it is alleged that the supply pipe of the water system passes through the sloughs of the Willamette river at a point near which the main sewer from the city empties, and that the pipe is defective, permitting mingled river water and sewage to seep into the water supply.

Last year there were between 200 and 300 cases of typhoid fever in the city, of which about 20 were fatal. It is alleged that the water company made no effort to protect its water pipe at the time, and therefore the suit is based upon negligence.

Married in Forty Seconds.

Danville, Ky.—Judge G. W. Coulter eclipsed all records as a performer of matrimonial ceremonies when he married Robert Lynch of Washington and Miss Pansy Bennington of Nicholasville. They met here and were granted a marriage license. They only had five minutes in which to catch their train and Judge Carter, desiring to facilitate matters, tied the knot in exactly 40 seconds.

TOWN HAS INAUGURATED CLEAN-UP MOVEMENT

Get Together Effort to Make "City Beautiful"—William Willoby Laid to Rest—Large Real Estate Transaction.

(Special Correspondence.) Athena, Ore., Mar. 17.—The city of Athena is busy cleaning streets, repairing sidewalks and building new cross walks. An effort is being made by the Commercial club and citizens to make the city more attractive in its general appearance. A band of men have been busy for the past several days cleaning and beautifying the city park in the east side of which a base ball ground is being prepared.

The funeral of the late William Willoby was held here today from the First Christian church of which Mr. Willoby was a member. The funeral service was conducted by the pastor, A. McKenzie Meldrum, who paid a beautiful and touching tribute to the life and character of the deceased.

One of the largest real estate deals of the year was closed here today when the papers were signed conveying the J. A. Baddeley ranch north of town to John Bannister. The ranch consists of 510 acres and the consideration was \$100 per acre, or \$51,000.

MOURNED AS DEAD: EXPLORER COMES HOME

Washington.—Mourned as dead by his wife and friends for the last four months, Arthur T. Leith, a geologist, explorer and hunter, has returned, safe and well, from the frozen regions of Labrador, to his home in Washington. Leith started out last summer from the north shore of Lake Superior, with his brother, Dr. C. K. Leith, professor of geology in the University of Wisconsin; F. S. Adams of Duluth and Hugh Roberts of Superior, Wis. They were 150 miles north of the Labrador trading post of Great Whales. Dr. Leith and Mr. Roberts made their way home in the fall, but the other two men remained until Christmas and experienced terrible hardships.

WATER FROZEN; NO BATHS FOR CHILDREN

Kansas City, Mo.—"We haven't had a bath since the weather turned cold. Mamma said we would take cold."

That statement was signed by Margaret and Hanna Reese, 11 year old twins, who attend the Hyde Park school. They live at 3269 Oak street. The father, Lester L. Reese, an electrician was in juvenile court. The plumbing system at his home had been frozen since winter weather began, he explained. He said his children had had baths every Saturday night, although not in the regular bathtub.

OLD BELOIT ACADEMY WILL BE ABANDONED

Beloit.—Beloit academy, founded 63 years ago as a preparatory school for Beloit college, will close at the end of the school year. It is said, and will not be reopened. The academy has not been supported by the college at a loss for many years and is considered too expensive for the purpose it serves. The academy building, which cost \$25,000, was given to the college 20 years ago by J. W. Scoville of Chicago. It was the first gift to Beloit under the administration of President Eaton. The college will make use of the building.

BAN ON WOMAN LAWYERS.

Russian Minister of Justice Doesn't Think They Are Sufficiently Educated

St. Petersburg.—The minister of justice, to whom was referred the request of the Duma for the introduction of a law authorizing the admission to the bar of women lawyers, has declined to do this, finding that the profession is already overcrowded; that the education of women in Russia is not on a sufficiently high plane and that this question can best be discussed in connection with the general sphere of female activity, now awaiting demonstration.

The liberal members of the Duma will not introduce their own measure, using the parliamentary right of initiating legislation. The question was raised by the recent appearance of Miss Fleishutz, whom the St. Petersburg Bar association had accepted as a member, as attorney in a criminal case. The prosecuting attorney refused to proceed with the case, holding that women, under the Russian law, are not authorized to practice law, in which he was supported by the imperial senate.

TRIPLE TRAGEDY DUE TO PEASANTS' IGNORANCE

St. Petersburg.—A horrible example of the low intellectual development of the people of Siberia is mentioned by the Siberian Press. In the village of Eodabo, in the Baikal territory, a woman who had to go to the village shop said to a child, "Look after the baby and see it does not cry."

"But if it does cry, what shall I do?" asked the child.

"Oh, then you must cut its tongue out," answered the mother with a careless laugh.

When the mother returned she asked: "Well, did baby cry?" "Yes," said the child. "And what did you do?"

"Oh, I cut its tongue out, and that stopped the crying."

The mother rushed to the cradle and found the child had bled to death. The tongue and a pair of scissors lay on the counterpane. In her grief the mother seized the child, who had taken her words so seriously, and dashed his head against the wall so violently that she killed him, and then she went outside and hanged herself.
