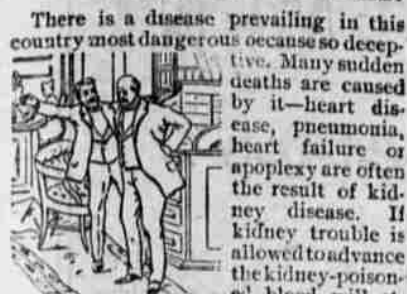

\$6.50 IS REACHED FOR TOP STEERS

HIGHEST POINT ON RECORD IS SCORED

Two Loads Sell at Advance of 10 Cents Over Anything Ever Offered in Yard—Highest Price for Bulls.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 21.—Two loads of steers sold in the stockyards today at \$6.60 per hundred pounds, advance of \$10 over anything heretofore offered in the yards.

Four loads of Shaniko steers came forward but they were contracted for previous to arrival at \$6.50. The latter were of extra select quality.

Market for calves is firm with nominal arrivals.

Cows are firm around \$5.50, this being the highest price ever reached here.

Hogs Holding at \$11.10.

No change is shown in the local hog situation, and a sale of very good quality was made today at \$11.10. While the exact weights were not obtainable it is stated by the receivers that the average was around 240 pounds. Therefore it is safe to put the extreme top of the cattle market at \$6.10 today.

There were arrivals of 364 head of sheep in the yards over Sunday. There has been a gradual increase in sheep shipments to market recently and with the early approach of shearing operations, the influx is expected to show a heavy increase.

From that most of the killers of the Pacific northwest are bringing in in dressed mutton from the south, indicates that they will not offer any material advance in prices for live stock.

Bulls Bring a Record.

Four bulls were sold in the yards today at the highest price ever reached here. This was at \$4.25. The animals averaged 1587 pounds and were in excellent. They were shipped in by Frank Smith & Son of Paulina, Crook county.

THE WHEAT MARKET

SO MUCH SMOKE MEANS THERE IS A LITTLE FIRE

Kansas News Continues to Tell of Poor Crop Prospects; Chicago Market in Sympathy With Growers.

Chicago, March 21.—Wheat trade responded to the cry of damage from Kansas and the central west and options closed 1-4 to 5-8c a bushel higher than Saturday.

Cries of damage are now coming from every section and while the trade is inclined to believe that many of the reports are false, it is quite apparent that there is fire where so much smoke exists.

Foreign markets were weak and lower with selling pressure quite pronounced at Liverpool. Market there opened 3-8d lower and closed 1-2 to 3-4d below the previous session. At Paris the market closed 1-4 to 1-2c lower and flour was likewise lower.

Primary markets showed a very firm feeling and at Kansas City millers were offering an advance of 1c. No. 1 northern is selling at Minneapolis at 1 to 2c a bushel above the May.

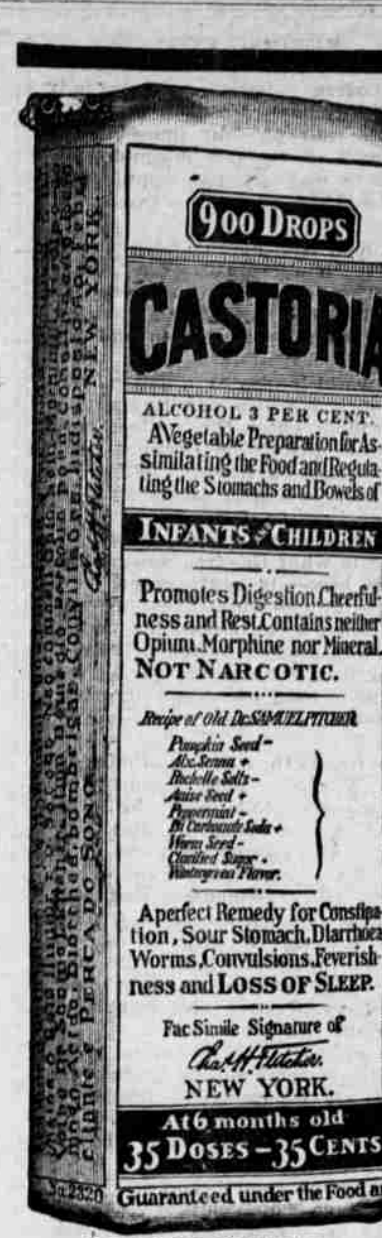
WOMAN'S MIND BLANK FOR TEN LONG YEARS

WOLVES CHASE MEN FROM MOUNTAIN HOME

Lisbon.—Terrible snow storms have been experienced at Audani and the neighborhood. Great packs of famished wolves have swarmed down from the mountains and invaded the town. A party of horsemen arrived at full speed at Audani, being pursued right into the town by a pack of over 200 wolves. The riders, who owed their lives to the fierceness of their horses had set out to tell the town authorities that the farms, ranches and plantations in the neighborhood were besieged by ferocious animals, and that the inmates were

prisoners. Several farmers who had dared to venture out had been devoured.

Next day the weather cleared somewhat, and the authorities organized a huge hunt, headed by the Civil Guards and detachments of infantry and cavalry. Although there was a tremendous slaughter of the wolves, many got away to their mountain homes, and it is feared that they will soon return. Eighteen of the hunting party received injuries.
